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CHAIRMAN'S STATEMENT “

DEAR SHAREHOLDERS,

On behalf of the Board of Directors (the “Board”) of Datapulse Technology Limited (the “Company”, together with its subsidiaries, collectively the “Group”), I am pleased to present the Annual Report for the financial year ended 31 July 2025 (“FY2025”).

I am glad to report that the Group has continued to build on the momentum from last year’s turnaround, delivering a year of steady performance and operational stability. This reflects not only the ongoing recovery in the regional hospitality sector but also the continued resilience and dedication of our team. It represents a milestone in our strategic recovery journey and underscores our commitment to creating sustainable value for our shareholders.

Our wholly-owned hotel, Travelodge Myeongdong City Hall (“TLMC”) in Seoul, South Korea, has benefited from the steady return of international tourism. We also hold a 15% stake in another hotel investment in Seoul, Travelodge Myeongdong Euljiro (“TLME”), and a 5% stake in Travelodge Harbourfront Singapore (“TLHS”).

In a key strategic development, RK One Hotel Management LLC (“RK One”), a wholly-owned subsidiary of the Group, served a termination notice for the Hotel Management Agreement (“HMA”) with Travelodge Hotel (Asia) Pte Ltd for the management of Travelodge Myeongdong City Hall on 30 June 2025. The HMA is set to expire on 31 December 2025.

Following a strategic review, RK One has entered into a brand licensing agreement with a new hospitality brand. Under the new arrangement, RK One will self-manage the hotel operations and will rebrand the hotel as Klaven Hotel Myeongdong City Hall, effective 1 January 2026. We believe this transition to a self-management model will unlock greater operational efficiencies and enhance the asset’s long-term value.

BUSINESS OUTLOOK

The Group remains cautiously optimistic about the outlook for the hospitality sector, supported by the continued recovery of international tourism and growing demand for travel experiences in South Korea. However, we remain mindful of ongoing challenges, including foreign exchange volatility, rising labour cost, inflationary pressures, and increased regional competition. To navigate this evolving landscape, the Group will continue to focus on optimising hotel revenue, enhancing operational efficiency, and managing cost pressures without compromising service quality. In addition, we are actively exploring opportunities beyond the hospitality sector to diversify our revenue base and strengthen long-term resilience.

For FY2025, the Group reported a slight decrease in revenue to \$6.0 million from \$6.2 million in the previous year. We remain in a healthy financial position with net cash of \$10.6 million as at the end of FY2025.

DIVIDEND

We continue to be mindful of the need to conserve cash to fund our operations and to take advantage of any opportunities that may arise. The Board is not recommending the payment of a dividend for FY2025.

APPRECIATION

On behalf of the Board of Directors, I would also like to extend my sincere appreciation to our directors, our shareholders, business partners, and all our stakeholders for their support. I would also like to thank our management team for their hard work and dedication.

REVIEW OF OPERATIONS AND FINANCIAL PERFORMANCE

FINANCIAL PERFORMANCE

The Group recorded total revenue of \$6.0 million in FY2025. The hotel operations business contributed \$5.9 million through the Group's hotel namely Travelodge Myeongdong City-Hall ("TLMC"), while the investment income contributed a total of \$0.1 million.

Korea Hotel operations revenue slightly decreased from \$6.0 million in the year ended 31 July 2024 ("FY2024") to \$5.9 million in FY2025, primarily due to the negative impact of foreign currency translation arising from the depreciation of the Korean Won (KRW) against the Singapore Dollar (SGD).

Asset management fees were derived from managing a hotel asset. The revenue from asset management fees amounted to S\$0.2 million in FY2024. No revenue was recorded in FY2025 following the expiration of the asset management agreement on 31 December 2023.

Revenue from investments increased from \$0.03 million in FY2024 to \$0.1 million in FY2025, as the Group increased its investments in debt securities, which generated higher returns compared to fixed deposits.

The decrease in other income from \$0.4 million in FY2024 to \$0.3 million in FY2025 was mainly due to lower interest income and reduced fund allocation to fixed deposits.

The gain on fair value of investment represents the fair value recognition of debt securities as at 31 July 2025.

Staff costs decreased from \$1.5 million in FY2024 to \$1.3 million in FY2025, primarily due to a reduction in headcount.

The slight decrease in hotel operation expenses from \$2.5 million in FY2024 to \$2.4 million in FY2025, primarily due to the impact of foreign currency translation arising from the depreciation of KRW against SGD.

The depreciation charged primarily arose from the Group's freehold building and associated renovation works. Depreciation was \$0.6 million in FY2024 and decreased slightly to \$0.57 million in FY2025, mainly due to the full depreciation of certain assets during the year and the impact of foreign currency translation arising from the depreciation of KRW against SGD.

The decrease in finance costs was mainly due to the repayment of the bank loan in Singapore, which was fully settled in February 2025.

The reversal of impairment of freehold building of \$2.9 million in FY2024, primarily attributed to a favorable independent valuation of the freehold building.

Other operating expenses increased from \$1.2 million in FY2024 to \$1.3 million in FY2025, mainly due to a \$0.3 million foreign exchange loss resulting from remittances in Korean won to Singapore dollars, partly offset by a decrease in professional fees incurred during the year.

The decrease in tax credits from \$0.9 million in FY2024 to \$25,000 in FY2025 was mainly due to the following factors: In FY2024, there was a reversal of a \$0.5 million income tax provision for the prior year as the obligation had lapsed, along with the recognition of \$0.4 million in deferred tax assets from previously unrecognised tax losses. In FY2025, the recognition of \$39,000 in deferred tax assets related to current year recognised tax losses, partly offset by a tax payable of \$14,000 on dividend income remitted from the Korea entity to the Singapore's subsidiaries.

Based on the above, the Group's profit attributable to owner of the Company was \$0.8 million in FY2025 as compared to \$4.5 million in FY2024.



REVIEW OF OPERATIONS AND FINANCIAL PERFORMANCE



REVIEW OF FINANCIAL POSITION

Property, plant, and equipment decreased from \$38.1 million as at 31 July 2024 to \$35.9 million as at 31 July 2025, mainly due to foreign exchange movement of approximately \$1.7 million arising from the appreciation of SGD against KRW, and depreciation charged of \$0.5 million during the year. This was partly offset by acquisitions of \$16,000 during the year.

Rights of use assets of \$42,000 as at 31 July 2025 mainly relates to the Singapore's office lease.

Long-term investment securities consist of a 15% minority interest in a hotel in Seoul, South Korea and a 5% minority interest in a hotel in Singapore.

Long-term receivables of \$6.3 million as at 31 July 2025 pertain to shareholder loans extended to two investee companies, in which the Group holds a 15% interest and 5% interest, respectively.

The decrease in current trade and other receivables was mainly due to timing of receipts for trade receivables and maturing fixed deposits placed with banks.

Short-term investment securities relate to quoted investments held for trading and carried at fair value through profit or loss.

The decrease in loans and borrowings was primarily due to the full repayment of the principal during the year 2025.

The decrease in trade and other payables was mainly due to payments made during the year.

REVIEW OF CASH FLOW

Net cash used in operating activities of \$2.6 million in FY2025, was mainly due to additions of quoted investments during the year.

Net cash generated from investing activities of \$0.3 million in FY2025, was mainly due to interest received from fixed deposits.

Net cash used in financing activities amounted to \$0.5 million in FY2025, resulting from the repayment of bank loans and lease liabilities, partly offset by movements in pledged deposits.

As a result of the above, the Group's cash and bank balances decreased from \$14.2 million as at 31 July 2024 to \$10.6 million as at 31 July 2025.

Lead Independent Non-Executive Director

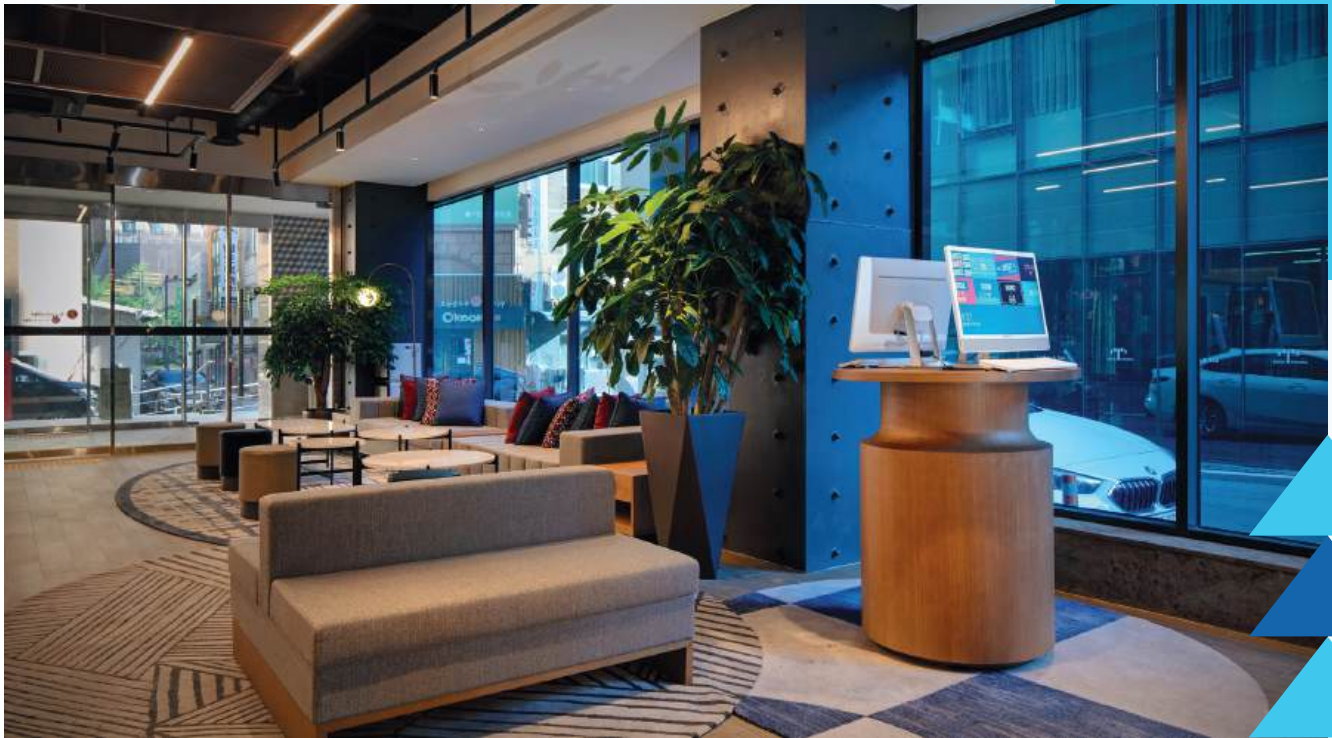

ABOUT THIS REPORT

As a responsible corporate entity, Datapulse is committed to transparently and systematically communicating the impacts of its operations. This eighth Sustainability Report provides a comprehensive account of our strategies and performance in addressing the most material Environmental, Social, and Governance ("ESG") issues over the past year.

External assurance was not sought for this Report. However, CLA Global TS Risk Advisory Pte Ltd ("**CLA**"), the Company's internal auditor, conducted an internal review of the Group's sustainability reporting processes during FY2025. All performance metrics presented are derived from internal data systems and source documents, with internal verification measures implemented to ensure data accuracy and reliability.

REPORTING SCOPE AND PERIOD

This Report focuses on operations that are either wholly owned or directly managed by Datapulse. These include our Investment Business based in Singapore and selected aspects of our Property Business—particularly the management of Travelodge Myeongdong City Hall ("**TLMC**") in Seoul, South Korea. The disclosures cover our financial year from 1 August 2024 to 31 July 2025, with relevant historical data included for comparison where appropriate.

in accordance with upcoming regulatory requirements and will be providing the disclosure of Scope 1 and Scope 2 emissions in accordance with the ISSB standards by FY2026 and full ISSB-aligned climate-related reporting by FY2031.

This includes both majority and minority interests, pursued either independently or through strategic partnerships. Our investment approach centres on a value-add strategy, targeting underperforming or undervalued assets in prime locations with strong potential for operational and physical enhancement.

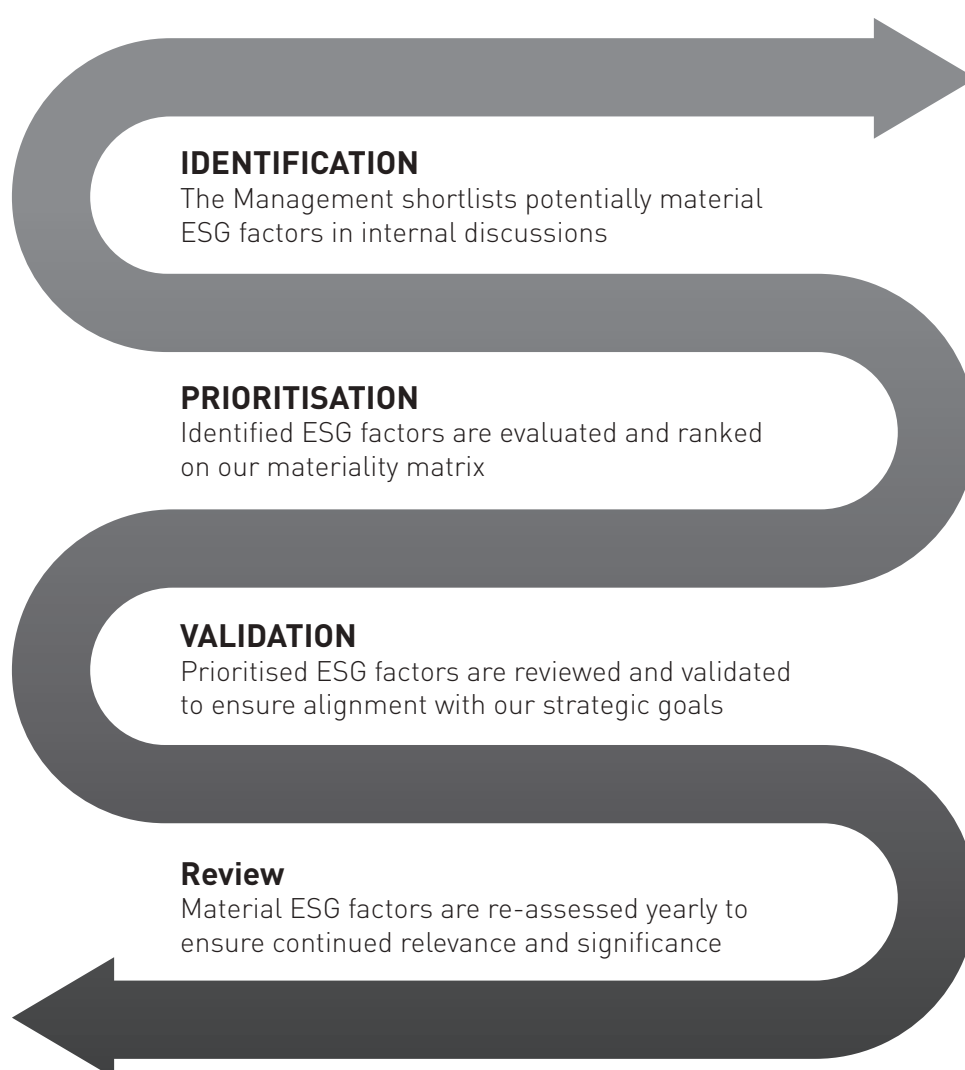

The Group employs a structured method to assess our materiality subjects, as depicted below:

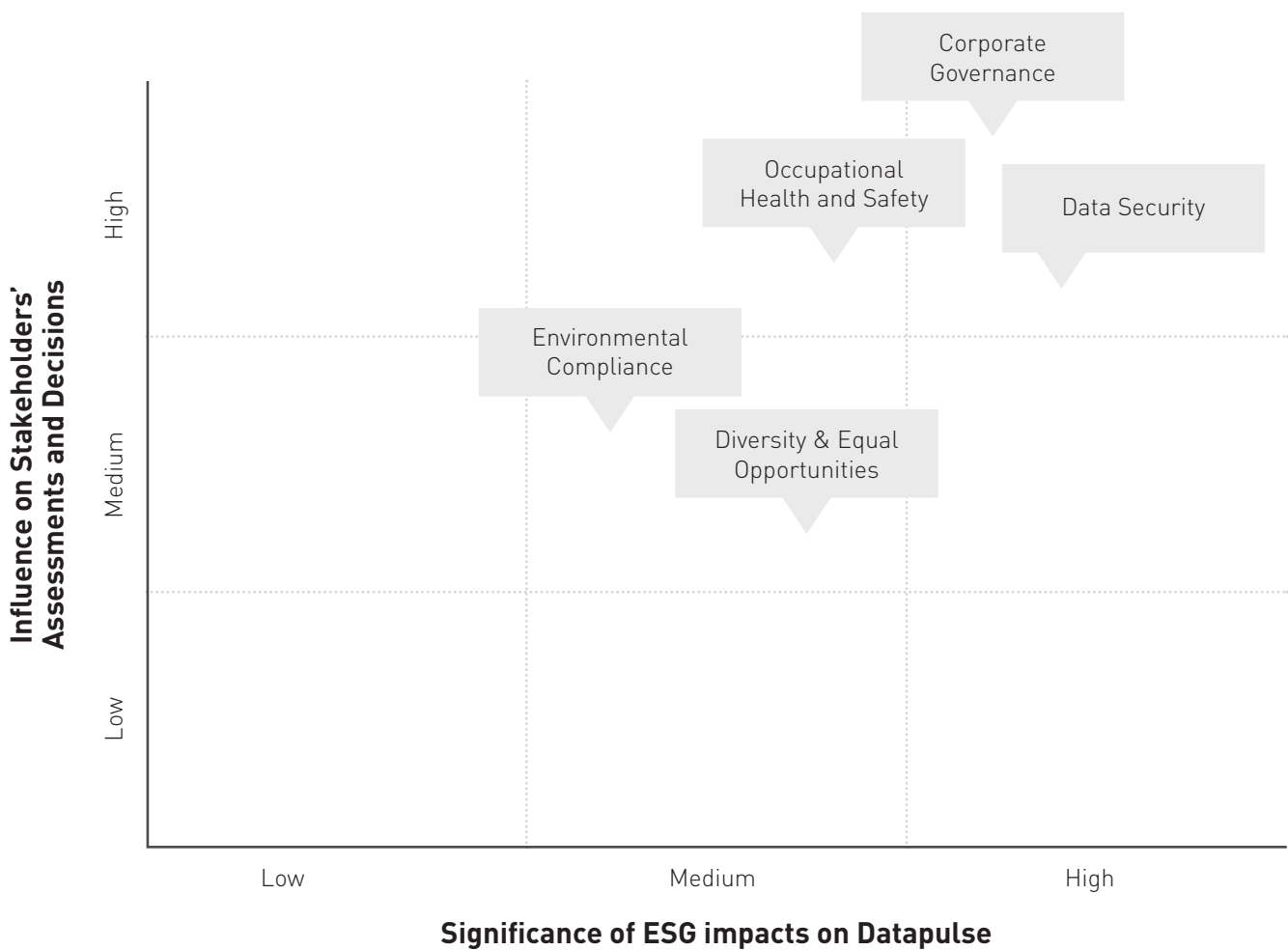

CORPORATE GOVERNANCE

As a responsible corporate entity, Datapulse is fully committed to upholding the highest standards of ethical compliance. We have established stringent policies to prevent fraud, corruption, and misconduct, ensuring all our operations comply with relevant laws and regulations.

MANAGEMENT APPROACH

In line with the Code of Corporate Governance 2018, we have developed a robust corporate governance framework comprising comprehensive policies and procedures applicable across the Group. All employees are required to adhere to these internal guidelines, which are approved and overseen by our Board. All new employees receive orientation on these policies. Our corporate service provider keeps Management updated on relevant changes in SGX-ST listing rules and the Companies Act, which are communicated promptly to Directors and employees.

Key policies include:

WHISTLEBLOWING POLICY

This policy provides a secure and confidential channel for both internal and external stakeholders to report suspected misconduct or irregularities, with protections against retaliation. The Audit Committee receives and ensures impartial, thorough, and timely investigations of all reports. CONFLICT OF INTEREST POLICY

Per our Code of Ethics, all employees must complete a Conflict-of-Interest Declaration upon joining and annually thereafter, with any changes promptly reported to Human Resources. New hires receive policy training during orientation, and ongoing reminders are regularly communicated to all staff.

RELATED PARTIES POLICY

The Related Parties policy requires disclosure of transactions involving related parties with direct or indirect material interests, with clear procedures for reporting such engagements.

DEALING IN SECURITIES POLICY

Directors, Management, and employees are prohibited from trading the Group's securities while in possession of price-sensitive information. This restriction applies one month before full-year results and two weeks before half-year results announcements until the release of the respective financial statements.

INVESTOR RELATIONS POLICY

Datapulse is dedicated to providing timely, accurate, unbiased, and transparent communication about the Group's performance, position, and prospects. The policy ensures structured and effective engagement with the investment community, fostering informed decision-making.

FINANCIAL REPORTING POLICY

This policy defines the responsibilities of Directors and Management to ensure compliance with all applicable accounting standards, legal requirements, and ethical guidelines, supported by appropriate internal controls and procedures.

BOARD DIVERSITY POLICY

We are committed to promoting diversity and inclusivity within the Board by appointing Directors with varied skills, knowledge, perspectives, and backgrounds. The Nominating Committee actively supports these objectives to enhance innovation and secure sustainable growth.

PERFORMANCE AND TARGETS

In FY2025, no violations concerning the SGX-ST's listing rules or incidents of employee misconduct or corruption were reported. We aim to maintain this record in FY2026. The Group continues to review and enhance its corporate governance policies and Code of Ethics. Our whistleblowing policy is up-to-date with SGX-ST's latest requirements, and we emphasise to all employees the importance of upholding the highest ethical standards.

ENVIRONMENTAL COMPLIANCE

MANAGEMENT APPROACH

As a Group, Datapulse is firmly committed to environmental responsibility that surpasses basic regulatory requirements. We actively pursue initiatives to reduce our ecological footprint by optimising energy and water usage and minimising waste within our hotel operations. These efforts not only contribute to cost efficiency but also align with the preferences of eco-conscious guests.

Our hotels have adopted a range of sustainable practices, such as installing energy-saving lighting and appliances in rooms, encouraging guests to conserve resources, utilising district cooling systems for air-conditioning, cutting down on disposable products, and strengthening waste recycling programs. Additionally, we ensure that our staff are well-informed on environmental legislation relevant to our operations, including South Korea's Waste Management Act and Environmental Impact Assessment Act.

We are committed to reducing single-use plastics by eliminating the provision of complimentary plastic water bottles in guest rooms. Instead, water dispensers have been placed on each floor, providing convenient access to fresh water and significantly lowering plastic waste. This step highlights our dedication to sustainability and encourages responsible behaviors among our guests.

In line with our sustainability goals, we engage in energy conservation initiatives and maintain clear communication of our environmental policies with both employees and guests. This cooperative approach supports compliance and bolsters our environmental performance.

To lessen the environmental impact of cleaning processes, we have implemented a policy whereby guest rooms are tidied every three days and receive a full cleaning every six days, with this schedule communicated to guests at check-in. This practice reduces water and detergent consumption and lowers the environmental costs associated with laundering. Furthermore, the recent boiler upgrades have enhanced energy efficiency and reduced emissions, aligning with local environmental regulations.

Datapulse remains dedicated to fully complying with all environmental laws and regulations. Beyond compliance, we strive to minimise any adverse environmental effects stemming from our business activities.

PERFORMANCE AND TARGETS

In FY2025, the Group did not identify any incidence of non-compliance with local environmental laws and regulations. We will continue to uphold this standard through ongoing policy evaluations, operational reviews, and adherence to evolving best practices. Our objective is to sustain a record free of environmental non-compliance in the years ahead.

Employees undergo annual performance evaluations that assess their achievements and guide decisions on salary adjustments, bonuses, and career advancement opportunities.

We actively monitor diversity and equal opportunity through employee feedback and training outcomes, while striving to maintain a balanced gender ratio at all levels of our workforce. Our diversity strategy is continually refined to inform decision-making and set future targets, reinforcing our commitment to building an inclusive and equitable workplace.

DATA SECURITY

MANAGEMENT APPROACH

Protecting our customers' personal data is a core priority in our operations, ensuring that it is collected, used, and managed responsibly. In the hospitality sector, safeguarding guest information is vital to maintaining trust and achieving long-term success.

We strictly comply with all relevant privacy laws and regulations, including Singapore's Personal Data Protection Act ("**PDPA**") and South Korea's Personal Information Protection Act ("**PIPA**"). In Singapore, a dedicated Data Protection Officer oversees PDPA compliance, regularly reviewing and updating policies to align with legislative changes and industry best practices.

In South Korea, we meet PIPA standards by implementing rigorous measures to safeguard guest information. This includes strict access controls, secure storage of consent forms obtained during business transactions, and clear communication with guests—prior to online bookings, inquiries, or check-ins—about the type of data collected and its intended purpose. Guests provide informed consent before any personal information is gathered, and we maintain a strict policy against using data beyond the agreed purposes. Unnecessary information is securely disposed of in line with regulatory requirements.

To ensure ongoing compliance, all hotel staff receive annual refresher training on data privacy regulations and internal protocols, while new hires undergo thorough onboarding in these matters.

We will continue to review and strengthen our personal data protection policies, ensuring they are effectively communicated to employees and consistently applied, creating a safe, secure, and trustworthy environment for all our hotel guests.

PERFORMANCE AND TARGETS

We are pleased to report that the Group did not receive any substantiated complaints concerning privacy breaches or data loss in FY2025. Moreover, no violations of data protection laws, including the PDPA and PIPA, were identified. We remain committed to regularly reviewing and strengthening our data privacy practices and raising awareness among employees to ensure the continued protection of guest data. Our aim is to sustain our clean compliance record into FY2026 and beyond.

OCCUPATIONAL HEALTH & SAFETY

MANAGEMENT APPROACH

Ensuring a safe and healthy environment for our employees and guests is a core priority for the Group. In response to the pandemic, we continue to implement enhanced health and hygiene protocols, including the provision of hand sanitisers at key locations and annual medical examinations for all staff. Our health and safety management system complies with all local regulations and guidelines, and we participate in a government-supported initiative by the Ministry of Labour and Employment and the Korea Occupational Health and Safety Agency. As part of this program, a government-appointed occupational health nurse visits our workplace annually to provide complimentary services aimed at preventing occupational injuries and illnesses and improving workplace conditions. We maintain records of work-related injuries and conduct periodic training to strengthen employee awareness of occupational health and safety matters.

Our hotel operations have both positive and negative socio-economic impacts on the communities in which we operate. Potential negative impacts include economic leakage where profits may be repatriated overseas, inflationary pressures on local goods and housing, seasonal employment instability, high resource consumption, waste generation, ecosystem disruption, labor rights risks, privacy concerns, and exposure to security threats. Conversely, our activities contribute positively by creating direct and indirect employment, generating tax revenue, supporting local businesses, promoting tourism, adopting sustainable operational practices, funding conservation initiatives, upholding fair labor standards, fostering diversity and inclusion, and investing in community development projects.

By integrating health, safety, and socio-economic considerations into our operations, we strive to protect people, minimise negative impacts, and enhance the positive contributions we bring to local communities.

To strengthen our safety culture, we provide ongoing training for employees on various aspects of occupational health and safety. These include:

- Occupational Safety and Health Education
- Workplace Sexual Harassment Prevention
- Workplace Bullying Prevention
- Personal Data Protection Training
- Disability Awareness in the Workplace

The training, mandated by Korean law, is compulsory for all employees and delivered online for a fee. Conducted during paid working hours, it allows employees the flexibility to complete it at their convenience, an approach considered highly effective. These programmes ensure that employees remain informed about regulatory updates and are better equipped to understand their rights and responsibilities in the workplace.

PERFORMANCE AND TARGETS

In FY2025, we are pleased to share that we have been fully compliant with local health and safety regulations and there has been zero cases of work-related injuries and zero instances of work-related ill health among our employees. We strive to maintain these records, and we will continue to conduct periodic training for our employees to enhance their understanding of occupational health and safety-related matters.

GOVERNANCE

Board's oversight of climate-related risks and opportunities

The Board actively oversees climate-related risks and opportunities, staying informed through biannual ESG-focused seminars that provide updates on emerging regulatory and sustainability developments. Climate considerations are embedded in the Board's review of corporate strategy, long-term planning, risk management policies, annual budgets, and business plans. They also guide the setting of performance objectives, the evaluation of progress, and the oversight of major capital expenditures, acquisitions, and divestitures.

At the organisational level, climate-related risks and opportunities are integrated into decision-making and strategic planning through a structured process aligned with the sustainability framework. This approach influences decisions on energy sourcing, facility investments, product development, and supply chain resilience.

Management's role in assessing and managing climate-related risks and opportunities

Guided by the Board, the Sustainability Committee is responsible for formulating and implementing strategies to address climate-related risks and opportunities across the Group's operations. The committee embeds climate considerations into the Group's decision-making processes and sets performance targets to monitor progress. It reports annually to the Board, presenting updates and recommending improvements. To remain current on climate-related trends and best practices, committee members regularly attend ESG and sustainability seminars, conferences, and forums—often supported by external ESG consultants.

RISK MANAGEMENT

The organisation regularly looks at how climate change might affect its business by identifying both short, medium and long-term risks. To do this, the company uses tools like scenario analysis to understand possible future outcomes and has identified climate risks internally. Teams from different departments work together to review these risks. The company also talks to suppliers and stakeholders to better understand risks across the supply chain. All these help the Company stay prepared and make better decisions for the future.

METRICS AND TARGETS

Material climate-related metrics

The organisation determines material climate-related metrics through periodic risk assessments that incorporate input from cross-functional teams, consideration of applicable regulatory requirements, alignment with industry best practices (e.g., TCFD, GRI Standards), and engagement with stakeholder expectations.

We track a range of indicators to measure and manage climate-related risks and opportunities, including:

- Total greenhouse gas ("GHG") emissions
- Energy consumption
- Water usage
- Investments in climate adaptation and mitigation technologies
- Climate-related metrics are calculated using recognised emission factors from established databases. Data sources include metering systems, utility bills, fuel consumption records, and supplier-provided information.

Datapulse also monitors performance related to water, energy, land use, and waste management in line with the GRI Standards.

To enable meaningful trend analysis, we report historical data where available for up to three years. This includes emissions, energy and water consumption, waste generation, and climate-related financial investments.

Greenhouse gas emissions and related risks

With climate change becoming an increasingly urgent global issue, businesses are under intensifying scrutiny from regulators and consumers to take meaningful steps toward lowering their GHG emissions. At Datapulse, we acknowledge the importance of this responsibility and are taking proactive measures to evaluate and manage our environmental impact.

To this end, we have begun tracking our carbon footprint using the internationally recognised Greenhouse Gas Protocol. FY2024 has been designated as our base year, serving as the reference point from which future emissions data will be measured and compared.

GHG emissions (Scope 1 and 2) are calculated using the GHG Protocol Corporate Accounting and Reporting Standard. Scope 1 is based on direct emissions from owned assets (e.g. fuel use), Scope 2 on purchased electricity (location-based).

The following tables detail our total GHG emissions for FY2024 and FY2025, using the operational control approach to account for emissions within our scope of influence.

From FY2024 to FY2025, our Scope 1 emissions, which are attributable to natural gas used in the kitchen, broiler, and gas heat pumps, showed a slight increase. The total volume of natural gas consumed rose from 132,129 m³ in FY2024 to 134,186 m³ in FY2025, resulting in a corresponding increase in Scope 1 emissions from 250.0 tCO₂e to 253.7 tCO₂e, representing an approximate 1.5% increase year-on-year.

In contrast, our Scope 2 emissions, which arise from the purchase of electricity from the national grid, decreased slightly over the same period. Electricity consumption decreased from 501,142 kWh in FY2024 to 498,011 kWh in FY2025, leading to a reduction in associated emissions from 206.5 tCO₂e to 204.8 tCO₂e, equivalent to a 0.8% decrease.

Datapulse Technology Limited (the “**Company**”) is committed to high standards of corporate governance so as to ensure greater transparency and protect the interests of its employees, customers and shareholders. The board of Directors (“**Board**”) and Management believe that good corporate governance is key to the integrity of the Group and essential to the long-term sustainability of the Group’s businesses and performance.

To discharge its governance function, the Board and its Committees have established policies and procedures to govern their activities. The Board and its Committees are guided by their respective Terms of References.

The Board is pleased to report to its shareholders on the Company’s corporate governance practices for the financial year ended 31 July 2025 (“**FY2025**”) with specific reference to each provision of the Code of Corporate Governance 2018 (the “**Code**”) issued in August 2018. The Board confirms that the principles and provisions of the Code have been adhered to save as highlighted and explained in this report.

Board Matters

PRINCIPLE 1: THE BOARD’S CONDUCT OF AFFAIRS

The company is headed by an effective Board which is collectively responsible and works with Management for the long-term success of the company.

The Board oversees the overall strategy and business direction of the Group and is collectively responsible for its success. Management also plays a pivotal role in providing the Board with complete, adequate and timely information to assist the Board in the fulfilment of its responsibilities.

Provision 1.1

Board’s Role

The principal functions of the Board include, inter alia, providing entrepreneurial leadership, setting the appropriate tone-from-the-top and desired organisational culture, monitoring Management’s performance, establishing a framework for prudent and effective internal controls to manage risk, safeguarding shareholders’ interests and the Company’s assets as well as setting values and standards (including ethical standards) for the Company. The Board is also mindful of the Company’s social responsibilities.

The Board sets the directions for the Company where ethics and values are concerned. This helps to nurture an environment where integrity and accountability are key.

The Board’s Conduct of Affairs

The principal functions of the Board include, inter alia:

- (a) Reviewing and monitoring the Group’s policies and practices for compliance with legal and regulatory requirements;
- (b) Monitoring and ensuring the training and continuous professional development of Directors and Management;
- (c) Setting long-term strategic goals, and reviewing and assessing the strategies of the Group from time to time, and monitoring the progress towards achieving these goals;
- (d) Approving the appointment of key management positions;
- (e) Approving the compensation packages and incentive payment structure for key management positions;
- (f) Reviewing and approving significant acquisitions and divestments by the Group;
- (g) Setting the dividend policy of the Group and declaring dividends, where appropriate;
- (h) Determining and reviewing the Company’s risk profile, risk tolerance level and risk strategy; and

- (ii) Conducting an annual, rigorous assessment of the adequacy and effectiveness of the Company's internal controls, including financial, operational, compliance and information technology controls, the effectiveness of its internal audit, risk management and compliance functions, and the adequacy of the resources allocated to these functions.

The Board exercises due diligence and independent judgment in dealing with the business affairs of the Group and works with Management to take objective decisions in the interest of the Group.

The Group has a conflict-of-interest policy for the objective review and approval of potentially conflicting relationships so that transactions which may be unfair or create the appearance of favoritism will be avoided and those which are fair and in the interests of the Group can continue to be enjoyed in the future. Any Director who has a conflict of interest which is likely to impact his or her independence or conflict with a subject under discussion by the Board is required to immediately declare his or her interest to the Board, remove himself or herself from the information flow and recuse from participating in any further discussion or voting on the subject matter.

Provision 1.2

Continuous Training and Development of Directors

To ensure that the Directors keep pace with regulatory changes that will have an important bearing on the Company's or Directors' obligations, the Directors are updated on such changes in between or during Board meetings and/or on specially convened sessions by professionals. The Company Secretary informs the Directors of upcoming conferences and seminars relevant to their roles as Directors of the Company.

The Directors are also encouraged to read up on and actively engage in informal discussions on subjects which are relevant to the Group's business.

Orientation for New Directors

Orientation programmes will be organised during the year for new incoming Directors to ensure that they are familiar with the Company's key businesses and corporate governance practices. This also allows the new Director(s) to get acquainted with Management, thereby facilitating board interaction and independent access to Management. The Directors may also at any time request further explanations, briefings and informal discussions on any aspect of the Company's operations or business.

Provision 1.3

Internal Guidelines on Matters Requiring Board Approval

The Company has adopted internal guidelines governing matters that require the Board's approval.

Matters which are specifically reserved to the Board for approval include but are not limited to:

Annual plans, risk appetite and performance targets for the Group;

- (a) The establishment of effective procedures for monitoring and control of operations including internal procedures for audit, risk and compliance;
- (b) Strategic business plans and policies of the Group;
- (c) Material acquisitions and disposals by the Group; and
- (d) Terms of reference of the Board and its Committees.

The matters which are specifically decided on and approved by the Board are clearly documented in the minutes of meetings and kept with the Company.

Provision 1.4

Delegation of Authority to Board Committees

The Board is supported by a number of Committees which assist it in the discharge of its responsibilities and also enhance the Company's corporate governance framework. These Committees include the Nominating Committee ("NC"), the Remuneration Committee ("RC") and the Audit Committee ("AC"). Each Board Committee has its own specific Terms of Reference setting out the scope of its duties and responsibilities, rules and regulations, and procedures governing the manner in which it is to operate and how decisions are to be taken.

Provision 1.5

Meetings of Board and Board Committees

The Board and its Committees meet regularly through scheduled meetings and as warranted by particular circumstances. If Directors are unable to attend meetings in person, telephonic means of communication are allowed under the Constitution of the Company. To enable members of the Board and its Committees to prepare for the meetings, agendas are circulated in advance, with board papers and related materials dispatched before the meetings.

The Board normally meets at least two times a year with additional meetings convened as and when necessary.

During FY2025, the Company has held five (5) Board Meetings.

Multiple Board Representations

All Directors are required to declare their board representations. The NC will review the multiple board representations held by the Directors on an annual basis to ensure that sufficient time and attention is given to the affairs of the Company. The NC considers that the multiple board representations held presently by the Directors do not impede their respective performance in carrying out their duties as a Director of the Company.

The Directors had committed considerable time towards the many Board meetings and Board Committees meetings held in FY2025 and adjusted their schedules to ensure participation in Board and Board Committees meetings for the deliberation of issues. The NC is of the view that the Directors have committed their time effectively to discharge their responsibilities.

Provision 1.6

Board's Access to information

Management places a high priority on providing complete, adequate and timely information to the Board on an on-going basis, in order for the Directors to discharge their duties efficiently and effectively. Board members receive half-yearly management reports pertaining to the operational and financial performance of the Group, including updates on the Group's financials, cash flow positions and operational performance of the Group's assets. The Board will also be updated on industry trends and developments. As far as is practicable, Board members will receive all Board papers not less than three business days in advance of the meeting to enable them to have sufficient time to fully consider and deliberate issues to be considered at the meetings. Minutes of the previous meetings are tabled and confirmed at Board meetings for the Directors' information.

Provision 1.7

Board's Access to Management and Company Secretary

The Board has at all times separate and independent access to Management through electronic mail, telephone and face-to-face meetings and are entitled at all times to request for any additional information needed to make informed decisions. Similarly, key management personnel, the Company's auditors or external consultants are invited to attend Board and Board Committees meetings to update and provide independent professional advice on specific issues, where necessary.

Directors have separate and independent access to the Company Secretary through electronic mail, telephone and face-to-face meetings.

The role of the Company Secretary includes the responsibility for ensuring that Board procedures are followed and applicable rules and regulations are complied with. Further, the Company Secretary assists in coordinating the flow of information within the Board and Board Committees as well as between Management and the Board. The Company Secretary also assists the Chairman of the Board and the Board in implementing and strengthening corporate governance practices and processes.

Appointment and Removal of Company Secretary

The appointment and removal of the Company Secretary is subject to the approval of the Board.

Board's Access to Independent Professional Advice

Where required, procedures are also in place for the Board and individual Board Committees to seek independent professional advice, at the Company's expense.

PRINCIPLE 2: BOARD COMPOSITION AND GUIDANCE

The Board has an appropriate level of independence and diversity of thought and background in its composition to enable it to make decisions in the best interests of the company.

Provisions 2.1, 2.2 and 2.3

Independent Element of the Board, Composition of Non-Executive Directors and Independent Directors on the Board

The Board currently comprises four Directors which include one Executive Director and three Independent Directors, thus providing a strong independent element on the Board, capable of open, constructive and robust debate on pertinent issues affecting the affairs and business of the Company and the Group.

Independence of Directors

The NC, in its determination in respect of the independence of a Director, takes into account, inter alia, the criteria given in the Listing Manual and the Code, the existence of any relationships between such Director and the Group, its related corporations, its substantial shareholders and officers and if applicable, whether such relationships can interfere, or be reasonably perceived to interfere, with the exercise of such Director's independent judgment.

The NC, having considered the declarations made by the Independent Directors in respect of their independence, is of the view that the current Board has an appropriate level of independence to enable it to make decisions in the best interests of the Company.

The Board confirms that none of the Independent Directors have served the Company for an aggregate of nine (9) years or more from the date of his/her first appointment.

Provision 2.4

Composition and Size of the Board

The NC conducts an annual review on the composition of the Board which comprises members from different backgrounds and whose core competencies, qualifications, skills and experiences are extensive and other aspects such as gender and age. Having reviewed and considered the composition and diversity of the Board and its Committees, the NC has determined that the current Board size and structure is adequate for the existing business operations of the Company.

The Board is also well supported by accurate, complete and timely information, and has unrestricted access to Management.

A summary of the composition of the Board and its Committees as at the date of this report is set out below:

The NC with the concurrence of the Board, is of the view that the current Board size of four (4) Directors is appropriate and that the Board possesses the appropriate diversity. The NC also takes into account the mix of skills and core competencies of its members, to ensure a good balance and diversity of skills, knowledge and experience. Amongst the directors are legal, accounting and finance professionals who possess the relevant expertise and skill sets in their respective fields for effective decision making.

The Board is committed to ensuring diversity on the Board and Board Committees including but not limited to appropriate balance and mix of skills, knowledge, experience, gender, age and the core competencies of accounting, finance, legal and regulatory, business or management experience, industry knowledge and strategic planning.

The Board has adopted a Board diversity policy and framework for promoting diversity on the Board and the NC is responsible for ensuring that this policy is implemented in an effective and practical manner. The NC will report to the Board periodically on the progress made in achieving the objectives set for promoting diversity.

The Board's internal policy in identifying Directors is primarily to have an appropriate mix of members with complementary skills, core competencies and experience that could effectively contribute to the Group, regardless of gender. The Board is mindful that diversity is not specific to gender or certain personal attributes but would extend to sectorial diversity, diversity as to experience and skills across various disciplines and would strive to ensure the diversity would enhance the long-term success of the Group. The objective of the policy is to guard against groupthink and foster robust and constructive debate leading to better decision making. This ensures that the Board composition is adequate to support the Group's needs in the short and long term.

The Board takes the following steps to maintain or enhance its balance and diversity:

- (a) annual review by the NC to assess if the existing attributes and core competencies of the Board are complementary and enhance the efficacy of the Board; and
- (b) annual evaluation by the Directors of the skill sets the other Directors possess, with a view to understand the potential gaps in the areas of expertise and competencies of the Board.

The NC will consider the results of these exercises in its recommendation for the appointment of new Directors and/or the re-appointment of incumbent Directors. As the Group's activities continue to grow, the NC will continuously review the composition of the Board and further consider other aspects of diversity such as gender and age so that it will have the necessary competency to be effective.

The Board, in concurrence of the NC, is of the view that the current Directors combined core competencies and experience are adequate to provide Management with a diverse and objective perspective to enable balanced and well-considered decisions to be made. The Directors' profiles are set out in pages 5 to 6 of this Annual Report.

Provision 2.5

Regular Meetings of Non-Executive Directors and Independent Directors

During the year, the Directors communicate among themselves without the presence of Management as and when the need arises and feedback is provided to the Board and/or Management, as appropriate. The Company also benefits from Management's ready access to its Directors for guidance and exchange of views both within and outside the formal environment of the Board and Board Committees meetings.

PRINCIPLE 3: CHAIRMAN AND CEO

There is a clear division of responsibilities between the leadership of the Board and Management, and no one individual has unfettered powers of decision-making.

Provisions 3.1 and 3.2

Roles and Responsibilities of Chairman and CEO

Mr Ang Kong Meng is the Executive Chairman of the Board and CEO of the Company. The Board is aware of the guidelines in the Code, and is of the view, that given the scope and nature of the operations of the Group, it is not necessary to separate the functions of Chairman and the CEO.

As the Executive Chairman, Mr Ang Kong Meng is responsible for the overall leadership of the Board and engages Management regularly on pertinent issues. He approves the agendas for Board meetings and promotes a culture of open and free discussion amongst the Board. He also ensures that the Board receives timely and accurate information from Management, and provides valuable insight, guidance and advice on corporate governance systems and processes.

As the CEO, Mr Ang Kong Meng leads Management and has full executive responsibility for the overall management and performance of the Group's business. He translates the Board's decisions into executive action and is accountable to the Board.

Provision 3.3

Ms Yap Ming Choo is the Lead Independent Director of the Company. She is responsible for providing leadership in situations where the Chairman is conflicted, and is available to shareholders where they have concerns and for which contact through the normal channels of communication with the Chairman or Management are inappropriate or inadequate.

PRINCIPLE 4: BOARD MEMBERSHIP

The Board has a formal and transparent process for the appointment and reappointment of directors, taking into account the need for progressive renewal of the Board.

Provision 4.1 and 4.2

NC Membership and Terms of Reference

The NC comprises four (4) members, a majority of whom, including the Chairman, are Independent Directors. The composition of the NC is as follows:

The NC is guided by its written Terms of Reference, which sets out its authority and duties. The principal functions of the NC include, inter alia:

- (a) Making recommendations to the Board on all Board appointments and re-appointments;
- (b) Reviewing the multiple board representations of the Directors;
- (c) Formally assessing the effectiveness of the Board as a whole, the effectiveness of the Board Committees and the contribution by each individual Director to the effectiveness of the Board;
- (d) Reviewing the training and professional development programmes for the Board;
- (e) Reviewing the structure, size and mix of expertise and experience of the Board; and
- (f) Assessing the independence of Directors and level of independent element within the Board.

Each NC member shall abstain from voting on any resolution in respect of the assessment of his own performance or re-nomination as a Director.

NC Responsibilities

The key responsibilities of the NC include making recommendations to the Board on relevant matters such as the process for evaluating the performance of the Board as a whole. It also ensures compliance with the provisions of the Constitution of the Company which stipulates that at each annual general meeting of the Company ("**AGM**"), one-third of the Directors (or, if their number is not three or a multiple of three, the number nearest to one-third) shall retire from office by rotation in accordance with the Constitution, and may stand for re-election.

Each member of the NC abstains from voting on any resolution and making any recommendation and/or participating in respect of matters in which he is interested.

In accordance with the Constitution of the Company, new Directors must submit themselves for re-election at the next AGM of the Company and one third of the Directors (excluding Directors who were appointed to fill a casual vacancy or as an additional Director) must retire by rotation at each AGM and they shall be available for re-election.

The NC has recommended the nomination of Ms Yap Ming Choo, the Director who is retiring pursuant to Regulation 101 of the Constitution of the Company and Mr Lee Sok Khian, John, the Director who is retiring pursuant to Regulation 105 of the Constitution of the Company, for re-election at the forthcoming AGM. Upon re-election, Ms Yap Ming Choo and Mr Lee Sok Khian, John will remain as Directors of the Company.

Alternate Directors

There are currently no Alternate Directors on the Board.

Provision 4.4

Determining Directors' Independence

Each Independent Director completes a declaration to confirm his/her independence on an annual basis. The NC has reviewed the independence of the Directors as mentioned at page 33 of this report. In the opinion of the NC, Ms Yap Ming Choo, Mr Lee Sok Khian, John and Mr Yuen Pei Lur, Perry are independent based, inter alia, on the criteria given in the Listing Manual and the Code and their respective declarations.

Provisions 4.3 and 4.5

Process for the Selection and Appointment of New Directors

The NC evaluates the balance of skills, knowledge and experience of the Directors and determines the suitable size and composition of the Board required to add value to and facilitate effective decision-making of the Company, taking into consideration the scope and nature of the operations of the Company. In respect of an appointment of a new Director, a rigorous search process is undertaken by the NC which includes evaluating the academic and professional qualifications, knowledge and experience of potential candidate(s) in relation to the business of the Group, the independence (if applicable) and other directorships of the candidate(s). After deliberations, the NC would provide its recommendation to the Board in respect of the new Director.

New Directors are presently appointed by way of Board resolution or at a Board meeting, with the Board taking into account the evaluation and recommendation by the NC. Before making a recommendation to the Board, extensive searches on the candidates(s) are conducted and the NC ensures that the potential candidate(s) possesses the necessary skills, knowledge, qualifications, working experience and other relevant factors that could facilitate the Board in making sound and well considered decisions. Incoming Director(s) will also be required to make a declaration as to their interests in and/or independence from the Company. The NC will ensure that the new Directors are aware of their duties and obligations.

Key Information on Directors

Key information of each Director including directorships and chairmanships in other listed companies, other major appointments and principal commitments, academic/professional qualifications, membership/chairmanship in the Company's Board committees, date of first appointment and last re-election, etc. can all be found under the Directors' Profile section on pages 5 to 6 of this Annual Report.

PRINCIPLE 5: BOARD PERFORMANCE

The Board undertakes a formal annual assessment of its effectiveness as a whole, and that of each of its board committees and individual directors.

Provisions 5.1 and 5.2

Board Performance

The principal commitments of the Directors, if any, and other key information regarding the Directors are set out in the Board of Directors' Profile section on page 5 to 6 of this Annual Report.

The Board has an established process to assess and evaluate the effectiveness of the Board as a whole and additionally, has implemented a process to assess and evaluate the effectiveness of individual Directors in carrying out their roles, duties and responsibilities on the respective Board Committees.

The evaluation process involves each Director completing a questionnaire on the overall effectiveness of the Board covering areas such as Board's composition and conduct, Board's processes and procedures, Board's accountability, and evaluation and succession planning of key executives, as well as each Board Committees member completing a self-assessment questionnaire in respect of the effectiveness of their respective Board Committees.

The NC will, taking into account the results of the performance evaluation, for assessing the effectiveness of the Board as a whole, each of the Board Committees and each individual Director to the effectiveness of the Board, and where appropriate, propose a re-composition of the Board.

The NC has performed the assessment and reviewed the overall performance of the Board, Board Committees, and individual Directors for FY2025 and is satisfied that the Board as a whole and Board Committees have met the performance evaluation criteria and objectives and each Director has contributed effectively and demonstrated commitment to their respective roles, including commitment of time for the Board and Board Committee meetings and any other duties in FY2025.

All NC members have abstained from the voting or review process of any matters in connection with the assessment of his/her performance or re-appointment as a Director of the Company.

The Company does not engage an external facilitator in respect of the Board performance evaluation process.

Remuneration Matters

Matters concerning remuneration of the Board, key management personnel and employees who are related to the substantial shareholders, the CEO and/or Directors (if any) are handled by the RC whose primary functions include the development of formal and transparent policies on remuneration matters in the Company.

PRINCIPLE 6: PROCEDURES FOR DEVELOPING REMUNERATION POLICIES

The Board has a formal and transparent procedure for developing policies on director and executive remuneration, and for fixing the remuneration packages of individual directors and key management personnel. No director is involved in deciding on his or her own remuneration.

- (b) Reviewing and providing a recommendation to the Board on the adequacy and form of compensation of the Directors and key management personnel of the Group to ensure that the compensation is realistically commensurate with the responsibilities and performance of the Director and/or key management personnel and the Group;
- (c) Reviewing and recommending to the Board the terms of renewal for those Executive Director(s) whose current employment contracts with the Group has or is due to expire;
- (d) Reviewing the fees for Non-Executive Directors before proposing such fees to the Board for approval, taking into account factors such as the effort and time spent by and the responsibilities of such Non-Executive Directors;
- (e) Reviewing and recommending to the Board the talent management and remuneration framework for the Company, including staff development and succession planning; and
- (f) Reviewing and recommending to the Board the engagement of stakeholders with respect to remuneration matters.

Provision 6.4

RC's Access to Advice on Remuneration Matters

The RC has access to the professional advice of external experts in the area of remuneration, where required. No remuneration consultants were engaged by the Company in FY2025.

PRINCIPLE 7: LEVEL AND MIX OF REMUNERATION

The level and structure of remuneration of the Board and key management personnel are appropriate and proportionate to the sustained performance and value creation of the company, taking into account the strategic objectives of the company.

Provision 7.1

Remuneration of CEO and Key Management Personnel

The Company's remuneration structure for its CEO and key management personnel comprises both fixed and variable components. The variable component is linked to the Group/Company's performance and the individual personnel's performance. Such performance-related remuneration is designed to align with the interests of shareholders and other stakeholders and promote long term success of the Group.

Contractual Provisions Protecting the Company's Interests

The Company does not have any contractual provisions in the employment contracts with the CEO and key management personnel pursuant to which the Company may reclaim the variable components of remuneration from the CEO and key management personnel in exceptional circumstances, such as any misstatement of financial results, or misconduct resulting in financial loss to the Company and the Group. Notwithstanding the foregoing, the CEO owes a fiduciary duty to the Company and the Company should be able to avail itself of the relevant remedies at law against the CEO in the event of such breach of fiduciary duties.

Provision 7.3

Remuneration Framework

ACCOUNTABILITY AND AUDIT

PRINCIPLE 9: RISK MANAGEMENT AND INTERNAL CONTROLS

The Board is responsible for the governance of risk and ensures that Management maintains a sound system of risk management and internal controls, to safeguard the interests of the company and its shareholders.

Provision 9.1

Risk Management and Internal Controls System

The Board recognises the importance of maintaining sound systems of risk management and internal controls to safeguard shareholders' interests and the Group's assets. The AC oversees and ensures that such systems have been appropriately implemented and are monitored.

A summary of the Company's risk management and internal controls system is appended below.

Risk Management

The Group adopts a comprehensive and systematic approach towards Enterprise Risk Management ("ERM") to help identify, measure, prioritise and respond to the risks challenging its objectives, initiatives, and day-to-day operating activities.

As part of the Group's approach towards ERM, the Group has conducted on an annual basis a risk assessment exercise where the key risks of the Group have been identified and evaluated. In addition, the Group evaluates its risk exposure based on the likelihood and impact of each risk identified.

The Group recognises risk management as a collective effort beginning with the individual subsidiaries and business units, followed by the operating segments and ultimately Management and the Board, working as a team.

Internal Controls

A system of internal controls has been implemented to enhance the Group's internal control function in areas such as finance, operations, compliance and information technology. The internal control measures aim to ensure that the Group's assets are safeguarded, proper accounting records are maintained, and that financial information used within the business and for reporting is reliable.

Risk Committee

The responsibility of overseeing the Company's risk management framework and policies is undertaken by the AC with the assistance of the internal auditors. Having considered the Company's business operations as well as its existing internal controls and risk management systems, the Board is of the view that a separate Risk Committee is not required for the time being.

Provision 9.2

Adequacy and Effectiveness of Risk Management and Internal Control Systems

ERM is an essential part of the Group's business planning and monitoring process, and has been incorporated into its business cycle. The Group engages a professional audit firm, CLA Global TS Risk Advisory Pte. Ltd. ("CLA") to conduct internal audit reviews based on the plan approved by the AC.

During the year, the AC also reviewed reports submitted by the internal auditors relating to the effectiveness of the Group's internal controls, including the adequacy of the Group's financial, operational, compliance and information technology controls.

Board's Comment on Adequacy and Effectiveness of Risk Management and Internal Controls

The Board is satisfied that the Company has worked closely with the internal and external auditors of the Group to implement the recommended measures and procedures, and has strived to achieve high standards in risk management and internal controls.

Based on the framework of risk management and internal controls established and maintained by the Group, the work performed by the internal auditors, as well as the statutory audit review undertaken by the external auditors, the Board with the concurrence of the AC, is of the opinion that the internal controls (including financial, operational, compliance and information technology controls) and risk management systems that the Group has put in place are adequate and effective as at 31 July 2025. However, to meet the changing needs of the Group's business environment, continuous improvements will be required as the Group grows its business. The Board, has received assurance from the CEO and the Financial Controller that:

- (a) the financial records of the Group have been properly maintained and the financial statements for FY2025 give a true and fair view of the Group's operations and finances; and
- (b) the Group's risk management and internal control systems are adequate and effective.

The Board notes that the system of internal controls provides reasonable but not absolute assurance that the Group will not be affected by any event that could be reasonably foreseen as it strives to achieve its business objectives. In this regard, the Board also notes that no system can provide absolute assurance against the occurrence of material errors, poor judgment in decision-making, human error, fraud or other irregularities.

PRINCIPLE 10: AUDIT COMMITTEE

The Board has an Audit Committee ("AC") which discharges its duties objectively.

Provision 10.1

Roles, Responsibilities and Authorities of AC

The AC is guided by its written Terms of Reference, which sets out its authority and duties. The key functions of the AC include, inter alia:

- (a) Reviewing the financial reports of the Group and the related reporting process;
- (b) Reviewing the Group's risk management framework, system of internal controls and management of financial risks;
- (c) Reviewing the internal and external audit process of the Group, including making recommendations to the Board on the appointment, re-appointment, removal, remuneration and terms of engagement of such auditors and reviewing the annual audit plans (internal and external);
- (d) Reviewing the Company's processes for monitoring compliance with the applicable laws and regulations and code of business conduct;
- (e) Reviewing significant financial reporting issues and judgments so as to ensure the integrity of the financial statements of the Group and any formal announcements relating to the Group's financial performance;
- (f) If deemed necessary, reviewing the assurance provided that the financial records have been properly maintained, and that the financial statements give a true and fair view of the Company's operations and finances;
- (g) Reviewing the assurance provided on the adequacy and effectiveness of the Company's internal controls (including financial, operational, compliance and information technology controls) and risk management systems;

- (h) Overseeing the establishment and operation of the whistleblowing process in the Company;
- (i) Commissioning and reviewing the findings of internal investigations conducted where fraud or impropriety is suspected, or where there is a failure of internal controls or infringement of any Singapore law, rule or regulation which is likely to have a material impact on the Group; and
- (j) Considering the various disclosure requirements, particularly those required by regulatory bodies and ensuring that there is adequate disclosure in the financial statements to ensure and enhance transparency between the Company and relevant interested parties.

The AC has explicit authority to investigate any matter within its Terms of Reference. It has full access to, and has had the full co-operation of Management and staff. It also has full discretion to invite any Director or any member of Management to attend its meetings.

The AC reviews all interested person transactions entered into by the Group, including any interested person transactions ("IPT") in accordance with the Company's mandate for Interested Person Transactions ("IPT mandate") which was approved by shareholders at the extraordinary general meeting of the Company held on 14 March 2019. The IPT mandate was last renewed at the annual general meeting of the Company for FY2022 held on 29 November 2022. The IPT mandate was not renewed in subsequent year as it was no longer required or applicable and ceased to be in force. Directors who are interested in the Group's transactions recuse themselves from the deliberation and approval process in both the AC and Board. On a half-yearly basis, the AC also reviewed the financial results announcements of the Company before their submission to the Board for approval.

The AC has explicit authority to investigate whistle-blowing complaints and all whistle-blower complaints are reviewed by the AC and/or the Board pursuant to the Company's Whistle Blowing Policy to ensure independent and thorough investigation and adequate follow-up.

The AC had reviewed the external auditors' audit plan for FY2025 and agreed with the auditors' proposed significant areas of focus and assumptions that impact the financial statements. In its review of the financial statements of the Group for FY2025, the external auditors had discussed with Management the accounting principles that were applied and their judgment of items that could affect the integrity of the financial statements and also considered the clarity of key disclosures in the financial statements. The AC also reviewed and addressed, amongst other matters, the key audit matters as reported by the external auditors for FY2025. The key audit matters can be found on pages 60-62 of this Annual Report.

Management reported to and discussed with the AC the changes to the accounting standards and accounting issues which have a direct impact on the financial statements. Directors had also been invited to attend relevant seminars on changes to accounting standards and issues by leading accounting firms.

AC to Keep Abreast of Changes to Accounting Standards

In addition to the activities undertaken to fulfil its responsibilities, the AC is kept up to date by the Management, external and internal auditors on changes to accounting standards, SGX-ST rules and other codes and regulations which can have an impact on the Group's business and financial statements.

Independence of External Auditors

The AC oversees the Group's relationship with its external auditors. It reviews the selection of the external auditors and recommends to the Board the appointment, re-appointment and removal of the external auditors, the remuneration and terms of engagement of the external auditors. The annual re-appointment of the external auditors is subject to shareholders' approval at each AGM.

The AC has reviewed the independence and objectivity of the external auditors through discussions with the external auditors and an annual review of the nature, extent and charges of non-audit services provided by the external auditors.

In respect of the audit quality indicators, the AC had reviewed, in particular, the following areas: audit hours planned, experience of the team, adequacy of training received by the team, results of internal and third party's inspection of their work, compliance with independence requirement, quality control, staff oversight, and staff attrition rate.

The AC had recommended and the Board had accepted proposing to the shareholders, the reappointment of Forvis Mazars LLP as the independent auditors for the Group in the ensuing year. The Company has complied with Rules 712, 715 and 716 of the Listing Manual in relation to the Company's appointment of its auditors.

Whistle Blowing Policy

To encourage proper work ethic and facilitate the eradication of any internal improprieties, unethical acts, malpractices, fraudulent acts, corruption and/or criminal activities in the Group, the Company has implemented a Whistle Blowing Policy. The policy provides a mechanism by which concerns about plausible improprieties in, including but not limited to, matters of financial reporting, dishonest practice, suspected fraud, bribery and corruption, may be raised.

The Company's Whistle Blowing Policy allows not just employees but also external parties to raise concerns and the policy sets out confidentiality clauses to ensure that the identity of the whistleblower will be kept strictly confidential unless disclosure is required by law or regulatory authorities.

The Company has put in place the following processes:

- The Company has procedures for whistleblower to raise concerns to the AC Chairman via email at whistleblow@datapulse.com.sg and has an independent function comprising the AC Chairman and AC members to investigate whistleblowing reports made in good faith;
- The Company has clear channels through which staff and other persons may, in confidence, raise their concerns about possible improprieties, fraudulent activities or malpractices within the Company in a responsible and effective manner;
- The Company has arrangements to facilitate independent investigation of such concerns and for appropriate follow-up action;
- The Company has confidentiality clauses that protect identification of the whistleblower and ensures that the identity of the whistleblower is kept confidential; and
- The Company is committed to ensuring the protection of the whistleblower against any detrimental and unfair treatment, intimidation, retaliation or adverse employment action, for reports made in good faith and without malice.

The AC addresses issues and/or concerns raised and arranges for investigation and/or follow-up of appropriate action. The AC reports to the Board any issues and/or concerns received by it, at the ensuing Board meeting. Should the AC receive reports relating to serious offences, and/or criminal activities in the Group, they and the Board have access to the appropriate external parties, where necessary, who have the required skills and expertise to conduct the relevant investigations. Where appropriate or required, a report shall be made to the relevant governmental authorities for further investigation/action.

The Group takes concerns raised in respect of the integrity and honesty of its employees very seriously. The Whistle Blowing Policy as well as whistle blowing communication channel, has been disseminated to all staff via email on a yearly basis and is also posted on the Company's corporate website. A copy of the Whistle Blowing Policy is also made available at the Company's corporate website at <http://www.datapulse.com.sg/> and in the internal shared drive for staff reference. Staff are encouraged to report any behaviour or action that is reasonably suspicious or against any rules/regulations/accounting standards applicable to the Group (including the Group's internal policies). Whistleblowers may also approach the AC Chairman at whistleblow@datapulse.com.sg in confidence.

The Company treats all information received confidentially and protects the identity and the interests of all whistleblowers. The Group views concerns expressed anonymously as potentially less credible but the AC and/or the Board (where appropriate) nonetheless reserves the right to consider such concerns at their discretion.

All newly recruited employees are briefed on the existence of the Whistle Blowing Policy during the Group's induction programme.

The AC is responsible for the oversight and monitoring of whistleblowing and the Whistle Blowing Policy is reviewed by the AC from time to time to assess the effectiveness of the processes in place and to ensure that the said policy is updated to take into account any related changes in legal and regulatory requirements. The AC is satisfied that adequate arrangements are in place to ensure independent investigation and appropriate follow up actions are taken. The AC is of the view that the Whistleblowing Policy of the Company is in compliance with Listing Rule 1207(18B).

For FY2025 and up to the date of this report, there were no complaints, concerns or issues received by the AC.

Provision 10.2

Expertise of AC Members

The AC members bring with them invaluable professional expertise in the accounting and financial management domains.

The Chairperson of the AC is a Fellow of the Association of Chartered Certified Accountants and holds a Master's degree in Business Administration from University of Leicester, United Kingdom. The other members of the AC have many years of experience in business management and finance services. The Board is satisfied that the members of the AC have recent and relevant accounting or related financial management expertise and experience to discharge the functions of the AC.

Provision 10.3

Cooling-off Period for Partners or Directors of the Company's Auditing Firm

No former partner or director of the Company's existing auditing firm or auditing corporation is a member of the AC.

Provision 10.4

Internal Auditors

The AC's responsibilities over the Group's internal controls and risk management are complemented by the work of the Company's internal auditors ("**IA**").

The Company has outsourced its internal audit function to CLA. The Board has approved the recommendation of the AC to engage CLA as the IA. The AC assesses the adequacy of the Company's internal audit function through the review of CLA's audit plan and the quality of its report. The IA has unrestricted access to all the Company's documents, records, properties and personnel, including access to the AC. The IA's primary line of reporting is to the Chairman of the AC.

Internal Audit Function

The Company's internal audit function is independent of the activities it audits. The IA, CLA, is staffed with professionals with relevant qualifications and experience. The engagement with CLA stipulates that its work shall comply with CLA's Internal Audit Services Methodology which is aligned with the International Standards for the Professional Practice of Internal Auditing issued by the Institute of Internal Auditors.

The internal audit was conducted based on an internal audit plan that was approved by the AC. The internal audit plan entails a review of the major functions or business units of the Group.

Having reviewed the audit plan of CLA, the AC is satisfied that the Company's internal audit function is adequately resourced to perform the work for the Group.

Adequacy and Effectiveness of Internal Audit Function

The AC reviews the adequacy of the Company's internal audit function to ensure that internal audits are conducted effectively and that Management provides the necessary co-operation to enable the IA to perform its function. The AC also reviews the IA's reports and remedial actions implemented by Management. The AC was satisfied that the internal control functions were adequate and effective.

Provision 10.5

Meeting with External and Internal Auditors

During FY2025, the Company's internal and external auditors were invited to attend the AC meetings and make presentations as appropriate. The AC meets with the Company's internal and external auditors without the presence of Management at least annually.

SHAREHOLDER RIGHTS AND ENGAGEMENT

PRINCIPLE 11: SHAREHOLDER RIGHTS AND CONDUCT OF GENERAL MEETING

The company treats all shareholders fairly and equitably in order to enable them to exercise shareholders' rights and have the opportunity to communicate their views on matters affecting the company. The company gives shareholders a balanced and understandable assessment of its performance, position and prospects.

Provision 11.1

Sufficient Information to Shareholders

The Company believes in providing sufficient and regular information to its shareholders. In this respect, the Board adopts a comprehensive policy to provide clear, timely and fair disclosure of information about the Company's business developments and financial performance that may have a material impact on the price or value of its shares.

Providing Opportunity for Shareholders to Participate and Vote at General Meetings

Shareholders are informed of general meetings through notices published in the newspaper, the Company's announcements via SGXNET and the reports/circulars sent to all shareholders. All resolutions tabled at general meetings are put to vote by poll voting, where appropriate.

Shareholders are also informed of the rules and voting procedures governing such meetings.

Effective Shareholders' Participation

To facilitate shareholders' effective participation at general meetings, the Company holds its general meetings at a location which is considered convenient and accessible to shareholders. Shareholders of the Company receive the notices of all shareholders' meetings. The annual report and relevant circulars are made available to shareholders on the Company's website at <http://www.datapulse.com.sg/>.

The Group fully supports the Code's principle to encourage shareholders' participation during the general meetings. The Company's Constitution allows the appointment of not more than two proxies by shareholders to attend the AGM and vote on his/her behalf. Shareholders who hold shares through nominees are allowed to attend the general meetings as proxies without being constrained by the two-proxy requirement.

Provision 11.2

Resolutions at General Meetings

At the general meeting, the Board ensures that separate resolutions are proposed for approval on each distinct issue at general meetings to the extent possible, (or if not, the appropriate reason(s) therefor). Shareholders can vote either in person or through proxies.

Proxies for Nominee Companies

The Constitution of the Company allows all shareholders (who are not relevant intermediaries as set out in the Companies Act) to appoint up to two proxies to attend general meetings and vote on their behalf. The Companies Act allows relevant intermediaries such as the Central Provident Fund (CPF) agent bank nominees to appoint multiple proxies, and empower CPF investors to attend and vote at general meetings of the Company as their CPF agent banks' proxies.

Provision 11.3

Attendees at General Meetings

The Directors attend all general meetings of the Company to address issues raised by shareholders. The Company's external auditors are also present to address any relevant queries from shareholders on the conduct of the audit and the preparation and contents of the auditors' report. Appropriate key management personnel are also present at the general meetings to respond, if necessary, to operational questions from shareholders.

Directors' attendance at the general meetings can be found on page 31 of this Annual Report.

Provision 11.4

The Company, however, has not implemented measures to allow shareholders who are unable to vote in person at the AGM the option to vote in absentia, whether by way of mail, electronic mail, facsimile transactions or otherwise as the authentication of shareholder identity and other related security issues still remain a concern.

Provision 11.5

Minutes of General Meetings

The minutes of general meetings will be published on the SGXNET and on the Company's corporate website at <http://www.datapulse.com.sg/> within one month from the general meeting(s) date.

Provision 11.6

Dividend Policy

The Company has adopted a dividend policy to formalise the principles and practices that the Board applies in considering the level of dividend payments, if any. Pursuant to the Dividend Policy, the Board takes into account, inter alia:

- (a) the Company's actual and expected financial performance;
- (b) the level of cash, gearing, return on equity and retained earnings of the Group;
- (c) any restrictions on payment of dividends that maybe imposed by the Group's financing arrangement;

- (d) the Group's expected levels of capital expenditure and other investment plans; and
- (e) general economic conditions, business cycle of the Group's motion control business and other internal or external factors that may have an impact on the business or financial performance and position of the Company.

The declarations and/or payment of future dividends are subject to the Board's continuing determination that such declaration and/or payment would be in the best interests of the Group and shareholders, and are in compliance with all applicable laws and regulations.

Although the Group recorded a minimal profit for FY2025, the Board has therefore recommended that no dividend be declared, in view of the prevailing uncertainties and the need to reserve cash for potential business opportunities.

PRINCIPLE 12: ENGAGEMENT WITH SHAREHOLDERS

The company communicates regularly with its shareholders and facilitates the participation of shareholders during general meetings and other dialogues to allow shareholders to communicate their views on various matters affecting the company.

Opinion

We have audited the financial statements of Datapulse Technology Limited (the "Company") and its subsidiaries (the "Group") which comprise the statements of financial position of the Group and of the Company as at 31 July 2025, and the consolidated statements of profit or loss and other comprehensive income, changes in equity and cash flows of the Group for the financial year then ended, and notes to the financial statements, including a summary of material accounting policy information.

Basis for Opinion

We conducted our audit in accordance with Singapore Standards on Auditing ("SSAs"). Overview

Audit Approach

We designed a risk-based audit approach in identifying and assessing the risks of material misstatement at both the financial statement and assertion levels.

Materiality

Impairment assessment of freehold property classified under property, plant and equipment (refer to Note 3.2 and 9 to the financial statements) As at 31 July 2025, the Group's freehold property which comprises the land and building of Travelodge Myeongdong City Hall ("TLMC") in Seoul, South Korea, amounted to \$35.7 million. Management has engaged an independent valuer to assist the Group in determining the recoverable amount of the freehold property. In addition, as disclosed and explained in more detail in Note 3.2 <i>Key sources of estimation uncertainty</i>, there was a level of estimation uncertainty in determining the recoverable amount of the freehold property as at 31 July 2025 arising from changes in market and economic conditions brought on by macro-economic factors. We have identified the impairment assessment of freehold property as a key audit matter due to the significance of the carrying amount of the property and the use of significant management judgement and a range of estimates in determining the recoverable amount of the freehold property.	Our audit procedures included, and were not limited to the following: • We obtained and reviewed management's assessment of impairment indicators for the Group's freehold property. • We obtained and reviewed management's assessment of the recoverable amount of the Group's freehold property by performing the following: i. Assessed the appropriateness of the methodology used by the independent valuer to estimate the value in use; ii. Evaluated the objectivity and competency of the independent valuer and read the terms of engagement to determine whether there were any limitation in the scope of work or matters that might affect the objectivity of the independent valuer; iii. Read the valuation report, inquired with the management and the independent valuer, obtained explanations on adjustments made in light of the increased estimation uncertainty as well as the key assumptions including the cash flows and capitalisation rates; iv. Involved our internal valuation resources in assessing the appropriateness of the methodology and the reasonableness of the assumptions and inputs used by management as disclosed in Note 9 to the financial statements; and v. Reviewed the adequacy of the Group's disclosures in the financial statements relating to key sources of estimation uncertainty, and in relation to the impairment of property, plant and equipment, which are fundamental to users' understanding of this matter. They comprise key assumptions, estimation uncertainty, including information that the impairment recorded in the Group's financial statements as at 31 July 2025 was estimated based on conditions prevailing on that date.

1. General

Datapulse Technology Limited (the “Company”) is a limited liability company incorporated and domiciled in Singapore with its principal place of business and registered office at 190 Middle Road #14-01 Fortune Centre Singapore 188979.

The principal activities of the Company are investment holding and investment trading. The principal activities of its subsidiaries are disclosed in Note 12 to the financial statements.

The financial statements of the Group and the statement of financial position of the Company for the financial year ended 31 July 2025 were authorised for issue by the directors on the date of Directors’ Statement.

2. Summary of material accounting policies

2.1 Basis of preparation

The financial statements of the Group and the statement of financial position of the Company have been prepared in accordance with the provisions of the Singapore Companies Act 1967 (the “Act”) and Singapore Financial Reporting Standards (International) (“SFRS(I)s”) including the related interpretations of SFRS(I)s (“SFRS(I) INTs”) and are prepared on a historical cost basis except as disclosed in the accounting policies below.

The individual financial statements of each Group entity are measured and presented in the currency of the primary economic environment in which the entity operates (its functional currency). The financial statements of the Group and the statement of financial position of the Company are presented in Singapore dollar (“\$”) which is also the functional currency of the Company, and all values presented are rounded to the nearest thousand (“\$’000”), unless otherwise indicated.

In the current year, the Group has adopted all the new and revised SFRS(I)s and SFRS(I) INTs that are relevant to its operations and effective for annual periods beginning on or after 1 August 2024. The adoption of these new or revised SFRS(I)s and SFRS(I) INTs did not result in changes to the Group’s and Company’s accounting policies, and has no material effect on the current or prior year’s financial statement and is not expected to have a material effect on future periods.

The Group does not intend to early adopt any of the aforementioned SFRS(I)s. While they are still determining and finalising the impact, as of the date of preparation of this report, management does not expect a material impact from the adoption of the aforementioned revised/new accounting standards, with the exception of SFRS(I) 18 Presentation and Disclosure in Financial Statements on the financial statements of the Group in the period of their initial adoption.

SFRS(I) 18, effective for annual periods beginning on or after 1 January 2027, replaces SFRS(I) 1-1 Presentation of Financial Statements and introduces new requirements for presentation and disclosure in financial statements. SFRS(I) 18 mandates a new structure for the statement of profit or loss and also requires disclosure of newly defined management-defined performance measures, subtotals of income and expenses, and includes new requirements for aggregation and disaggregation of financial information based on the identified 'roles' of the primary financial statements and the notes. As a consequential result of SFRS(I) 18 requirements, all entities are required to use the operating profit subtotal, instead of profit or loss, as the starting point for presenting operating cash flows under the indirect method. The classification of cash flows from dividends and interests in either operating, investing and financing cash flows is also fixed.

SFRS(I) 18 will apply retrospectively. The Company is still in the process of assessing the corresponding impact on the primary financial statements and notes to the financial statements.

2.2 Basis of consolidation

The financial statements of the Group comprise the financial statements of the Company and its subsidiaries. Subsidiaries are entities (including structured entities) (i) over which the Group has power and the Group is (ii) able to use such power to (iii) affect its exposure, or rights, to variable returns from then through its involvement with them.

The Group reassesses whether it controls the subsidiaries if facts and circumstances indicate that there are changes to the one or more of the three elements of control.

When the Group has less than a majority of the voting rights of an investee, it still has power over the investee when the voting rights are sufficient, after considering all relevant facts and circumstances, to give it the practical ability to direct the relevant activities of the investee unilaterally. The Group considers, among others, the extent of its voting rights relative to the size and dispersion of holdings of the other vote holders, currently exercisable substantive potential voting rights held by all parties, rights arising from contractual arrangements and voting patterns at previous shareholders' meetings.

Subsidiaries are consolidated from the date on which control is transferred to the Group up to the effective date on which control ceases, as appropriate.

Intra-group assets and liabilities, equity, income, expenses and cashflows relating to intragroup transactions are eliminated on consolidation.

The financial statements of the subsidiaries used in the preparation of the financial statements are prepared for the same reporting date as that of the Company. Where necessary, accounting policies of subsidiaries have been changed to ensure consistency with the policies adopted by the Group.

Changes in the Group's interest in a subsidiary that do not result in a loss of control are accounted for as equity transactions. Any differences between the amount by which the non-controlling interests are adjusted to reflect the changes in the relative interests in the subsidiary and the fair value of the consideration paid or received is recognised directly in equity and attributed to the owners of the Company.

When the Group loses control over a subsidiary, the profit or loss on disposal is calculated as the difference between (i) the aggregate of the fair value of the consideration received and the fair value of any retained interest and (ii) the previous carrying amount of the assets (including goodwill), and liabilities of the subsidiary and any non-controlling interests. Amounts previously recognised in other comprehensive income in relation to the subsidiary are accounted for (i.e. reclassified to profit or loss or transferred directly to accumulated profits) in the same manner as would be required if the relevant assets or liabilities were disposed of. The fair value of any investments retained in the former subsidiary at the date when control is lost is regarded as the fair value on initial recognition for subsequent accounting under SFRS(I) 9 *Financial Instruments* ("SFRS(I) 9") or, when applicable, the cost on initial recognition of an investment in an associate or jointly controlled entity.

Investments in subsidiaries are carried at cost less any impairment loss that has been recognised in profit or loss in the Company's separate financial statements.

2.3 Foreign currency transactions and translation

Foreign currency transactions are translated into the individual entities' respective functional currencies at the exchange rates prevailing on the date of the transaction. At the end of each financial year, monetary items denominated in foreign currencies are retranslated at the rates prevailing as of the end of the financial year. Non-monetary items carried at fair value that are denominated in foreign currencies are retranslated at the rates prevailing on the date when the fair value was determined. Non-monetary items that are measured in terms of historical cost in a foreign currency are not retranslated.

Exchange differences arising on the settlement of monetary items, and on retranslation of monetary items are included in profit or loss for the year. Exchange differences arising on the retranslation of non-monetary items carried at fair value are included in profit or loss for the year except for differences arising on the retranslation of non-monetary items in respect of which gains and losses are recognised directly in equity. For such non-monetary items, any exchange component of that gain or loss is also recognised directly in equity through other comprehensive income.

Exchange differences relating to assets under construction for future productive use, are included in the cost of those assets where they are regarded as an adjustment to interest costs on foreign currency borrowings.

For the purpose of presenting consolidated financial statements, the assets and liabilities of the Group's foreign operations (including comparatives) are expressed in Singapore dollars using exchange rates prevailing at the end of the financial year. Income and expense items (including comparatives) are translated at the average exchange rates for the period, unless exchange rates fluctuated significantly during that period, in which case the exchange rates at the dates of the transactions are used. Exchange differences arising, if any, are classified as equity and transferred to the Group's translation reserve. Such translation differences are recognised in profit or loss in the period in which the foreign operation is disposed of.

On consolidation, exchange differences arising from the translation of the net investment in foreign entities (including monetary items that, in substance, form part of the net investment in foreign entities), and of borrowings and other currency instruments designated as hedges of such investments, are taken to the foreign currency translation reserve.

Goodwill and fair value adjustments arising on the acquisition of a foreign operation are treated as assets and liabilities of the foreign operation and translated at the closing rate.

2.4 Property, plant and equipment

Property, plant and equipment are stated at cost less accumulated depreciation and any accumulated impairment losses. The cost of property, plant and equipment includes its purchase price and any costs directly attributable to bringing the asset to the location and condition necessary for it to be capable of operating in the manner intended by management. Dismantlement, removal or restoration costs are included as part of the cost of plant and equipment if the obligation for dismantlement, removal or restoration is incurred as a consequence of acquiring or using the plant and equipment.

Subsequent expenditure relating to property, plant and equipment is added to the carrying amount of the asset only when it is probable that future economic benefits associated with the item will flow to the entity and the cost of the item can be measured reliably. All other repair and maintenance expenses are recognised in profit or loss when incurred.

Depreciation is charged so as to write off the cost or valuation of assets, over their estimated useful lives, using the straight-line method, on the following bases:

* Freehold land and building are collectively classified as "Freehold property".

No depreciation is charged on work-in-progress as they are not yet in use as at the end of the financial year.

The carrying values of property, plant and equipment are reviewed for impairment when events or changes in circumstances indicate that the carrying value may not be recoverable.

The estimated useful lives, residual values and depreciation methods are reviewed, and adjusted as appropriate, at the end of each financial year.

The gain or loss, being the difference between the sales proceeds and the carrying amount of the asset, arising on disposal or retirement of an item of property, plant and equipment is recognised in profit or loss. Any amount in the revaluation reserve relating to that asset is transferred to accumulated profits directly.

Fully depreciated plant and equipment are retained in the financial statements until they are no longer in use.

2.5 Impairment of non-financial assets

The Group reviews the carrying amounts of its non-financial assets as at each reporting date to assess for any indication of impairment loss. If any such indication exists, the recoverable amount of the asset is estimated in order to determine the extent of the impairment loss (if any). Where it is not possible to estimate the recoverable amount of an individual asset, the Group estimates the recoverable amount of the cash-generating unit to which the asset belongs.

Irrespective of whether there is any indication of impairment, the Group also tests its intangible assets with indefinite useful lives and intangible assets not yet available for use for impairment annually by comparing their respective carrying amounts with their corresponding recoverable amounts.

The recoverable amount of an asset or cash-generating unit is the higher of its fair value less costs to sell and its value in use. In assessing value in use, the estimated future cash flows are discounted to their present value using a pre-tax discount rate that reflects current market assessments of the time value of money and the risks specific to the asset.

An impairment loss for the amount by which the asset's carrying amount exceeds the recoverable amount is recognised immediately in profit or loss, unless the relevant asset is carried at a revalued amount, in which case the impairment loss is treated as a revaluation decrease.

Where an impairment loss subsequently reverses, the carrying amount of the asset (cash-generating unit) is increased to the revised estimate of its recoverable amount, but so that the increased carrying amount does not exceed the carrying amount that would have been determined had no impairment loss been recognised for the asset (cash-generating unit) in prior years. A reversal of an impairment loss is recognised immediately in profit or loss, unless the relevant asset is carried at a revalued amount, in which case the reversal of the impairment loss is treated as a revaluation increase.

2.6 Financial instruments

The Group recognises a financial asset or a financial liability in its statement of financial position when, and only when, the Group becomes party to the contractual provisions of the instrument.

Financial assets

Initial recognition and measurement

With the exception of trade receivables that do not contain a significant financing component or for which the Group applies a practical expedient, all financial assets are initially measured at fair value, plus transaction costs, except for those financial assets classified as at fair value through profit or loss, which are initially measured at fair value. Such trade receivables that do not contain a significant financing component or for which the Group applies a practical expedient are measured at transaction price as defined in SFRS(I) 15 *Revenue from Contracts with Customers* ("SFRS(I) 15") in Note 2.12.

The classification of the financial assets at initial recognition as subsequently measured at amortised cost, fair value through other comprehensive income ("FVTOCI") and fair value through profit or loss ("FVTPL") depends on the Group's business model for managing the financial assets and the contractual cash flow characteristics of the financial asset.

The Group's business model refers to how the Group manages its financial assets in order to generate cash flows which determines whether cash flows will result from collecting contractual cash flows, selling financial assets or both.

The Group determines whether the asset's contractual cash flows are solely payments of principal and interest ("SPPI") on the principal amount outstanding to determine the classification of the financial assets.

Financial assets at amortised cost

A financial asset is subsequently measured at amortised cost if the financial asset is held within a business model whose objective is to hold financial assets in order to collect contractual cash flows and the contractual terms of the financial asset give rise on specified dates to cash flows that are solely payments of principal and interest on the principal amount outstanding. Financial assets at amortised cost include long-term receivables, trade and other receivables, and cash and bank balances.

Subsequent to initial recognition, the financial asset at amortised cost are measured using the effective interest method and is subject to impairment. Gains or losses are recognised in profit or loss when the asset is derecognised, modified or impaired.

Effective interest method

The effective interest method is a method of calculating the amortised cost of a financial instrument and allocating the interest income or expense over the relevant period. The effective interest rate is the rate that exactly discounts estimated future cash receipts or payments (including all fees on points paid or received that form an integral part of the effective interest rate, transaction costs and other premiums or discounts) through the expected life of the financial instrument, or where appropriate, a shorter period, to the net carrying amount of the financial instrument. Income and expense are recognised on an effective interest basis for debt instruments other than those financial instruments at fair value through profit or loss.

Interest income is accrued on a time basis, by reference to the principal outstanding and at the effective interest rate applicable.

Financial assets held at FVTOCI

Investments in quoted corporate bonds are debt instruments and are subsequently measured at FVTOCI as these are held within a business model whose objective is achieved by both collecting contractual cash flows that are solely payments of principal and interest on the principal amount outstanding and selling the financial assets. Gains or losses are recognised in other comprehensive income, except for impairment gains or losses, foreign exchange gains or losses and interest which are recognised in profit or loss. Upon derecognition, the cumulative fair value changes recognised in other comprehensive income is recycled to profit or loss.

At initial recognition, the Group may make an irrevocable election to classify its investment in equity instruments, for which the equity instrument is neither held for trading nor contingent consideration recognised by an acquirer in a business combination to which SFRS(I) 3 *Business Combination* ("SFRS(I) 3"), as subsequently measured at FVTOCI so as to present subsequent changes in fair value in other comprehensive income. The election is made on an investment-by-investment basis. The Group has elected to designate investments in unquoted equity instruments at FVTOCI. Upon derecognition, the cumulative fair value changes are transferred to accumulated profits.

Dividends from equity instruments are recognised in profit or loss only when the Group's right to receive payment of the dividend is established, it is probable that the economic benefits associated with the dividend will flow to the Group and the amount of the dividend can be measured reliably.

Financial assets held at FVTPL

A financial asset is subsequently measured at FVTPL if the financial asset is a financial asset held for trading, is not measured at amortised cost or at FVTOCI, or is irrevocably elected at initial recognition to be designated FVTPL if, by designating the financial asset as FVTPL, eliminates or significantly reduces a measurement or recognition inconsistency that would otherwise arise from measuring assets or liabilities or recognising the gains and losses on them on different bases.

Gains or losses are recognised in profit or loss.

Impairment of financial assets

The Group recognises a loss allowance for expected credit losses ("ECL") on financial assets measured at amortised cost and debt instruments measured at FVTOCI. At each reporting date, the Group assesses whether the credit risk on a financial asset has increased significantly since initial recognition by assessing the change in the risk of a default occurring over the expected life of the financial instrument. Where the financial asset is determined to have low credit risk at the reporting date, the Group assumes that the credit risk on a financial asset has not increased significantly since initial recognition.

The Group uses reasonable and supportable forward-looking information that is available without undue cost or effort as well as past due information when determining whether credit risk has increased significantly since initial recognition.

Where the credit risk on that financial instrument has increased significantly since initial recognition, the Group measures the loss allowance for a financial instrument at an amount equal to the lifetime ECL. Where the credit risk on that financial instrument has not increased significantly since initial recognition, the Group measures the loss allowance for that financial instrument at an amount equal to 12-month ECL.

The Group uses a practical expedient to recognise the ECL for trade receivables, which is to measure the loss allowance at an amount equal to lifetime ECL using an allowance matrix derived based on historical credit loss experience adjusted for current conditions and forecasts of future economic conditions.

The amount of ECL or reversal thereof that is required to adjust the loss allowance at the reporting date to the amount that is required to be recognised is recognised in profit or loss.

The Group directly reduces the gross carrying amount of a financial asset when the entity has no reasonable expectations of recovering a financial asset in its entirety or a portion thereof.

Derecognition of financial assets

The Group derecognises a financial asset only when the contractual rights to the cash flows from the financial asset expire, or it transfers the financial asset and substantially all the risks and rewards of ownership of the asset to another entity. If the Group neither transfers nor retains substantially all the risks and rewards of ownership of the financial asset and continues to control the transferred asset, the Group recognises its retained interest in the asset and an associated liability for amounts it may have to pay. If the Group retains substantially all the risks and rewards of ownership of a transferred financial asset, the Group continues to recognise the financial asset and also recognises a collateralised borrowing for the proceeds receivables.

Financial liabilities and equity instruments

Classification as debt or equity

Financial liabilities and equity instruments issued by Group are classified according to the substance of the contractual arrangements entered into and the definitions of a financial liability and an equity instrument.

Equity instruments

An equity instrument is any contract that evidences a residual interest in the assets of the Group after deducting all of its liabilities. Equity instruments are recorded at the proceeds received, net of direct issue costs.

Ordinary share capital

Ordinary share capital is classified as equity. Incremental costs directly attributable to the issue of ordinary shares and share options are recognised as a deduction from equity.

Treasury shares

When shares recognised as equity are acquired, the amount of consideration paid is recognised directly in equity. Reacquired shares are classified as treasury shares and presented as a deduction from total equity. No gain or loss is recognised in profit or loss on the purchase, sale issue or cancellation of treasury shares.

Treasury shares (Continued)

When treasury shares are subsequently cancelled, the cost of treasury shares are deducted against the share capital account if the shares are purchased out of capital of the Company, or against the accumulated profits of the Company if the shares are purchased out of earnings of the Company, or proportionately against the share capital and accumulated profits accounts if the shares are purchased both out of capital and accumulated profits of the Company.

When treasury shares are subsequently sold or reissued pursuant to the employee share option scheme, the cost of treasury shares is reversed from the treasury share account and the realised gain or loss on sale or reissue, net of any directly attributable incremental transaction costs and related income tax, is recognised in the capital reserve of the Company.

Warrants

Warrants is classified as equity. Incremental costs directly attributable to the issue of warrants are recognised as a deduction from equity.

When the warrants are exercised, the proceeds received (net of transaction costs) and the related balance previously recognised in the warrants reserve are credited to the share capital account, when new ordinary shares are issued.

Upon expiry of unexercised warrants, the balance previously recognised in the warrants reserve is transferred to retained profits directly.

Financial liabilities

Initial recognition and measurement

All financial liabilities are recognised on trade date - the date on which the Group commits to purchase or sell the asset. All financial liabilities are initially measured at fair value, minus transaction costs, except for those financial liabilities classified as at fair value through profit or loss, which are initially measured at fair value.

Financial liabilities are classified as either financial liabilities at fair value through profit or loss or other financial liabilities.

Financial liabilities are classified as at fair value through profit or loss if the financial liability is either held for trading or it is designated as such upon initial recognition. Financial liabilities classified as at fair value through profit or loss comprise derivatives that are not designated or do not qualify for hedge accounting.

Other financial liabilities

Trade and other payables

Trade and other payables are initially measured at fair value, net of transaction costs, and are subsequently measured at amortised cost, where applicable, using the effective interest method, with interest expense recognised on an effective yield basis. A gain or loss is recognised in profit or loss when the liability is derecognised and through the amortisation process.

Borrowings

Interest-bearing bank loans are initially measured at fair value, and are subsequently measured at amortised cost, using the effective interest method. Any difference between the proceeds (net of transaction costs) and the settlement or redemption of borrowings is recognised over the term of the borrowings in accordance with the Group's accounting policy for borrowing costs (see Note 2.9). A gain or loss is recognised in profit or loss when the liability is derecognised and through the amortisation process.

Financial guarantee contracts

When the Company issues corporate guarantee to bank for banking facilities granted by the bank to a certain investee, the guarantee qualifies as financial guarantee because the Company is required to reimburse the bank if the investee breaches any repayment terms.

Financial guarantee contract liabilities are measured initially at their fair values plus transaction costs and subsequently at the higher of the amount of the loss allowance and the amount initially recognised less cumulative amortisation in accordance with SFRS(I) 15 *Revenue from Contracts with Customers*.

Derecognition of financial liabilities

The Group derecognises financial liabilities when, and only when, the Group's obligations are discharged, cancelled or they expire.

2.7 Provisions

Provisions are recognised when the Group has a present legal or constructive obligation as a result of a past event, it is probable that the Group will be required to settle the obligation, and a reliable estimate can be made of the amount of the obligation.

The amount recognised as a provision is the best estimate of the consideration required to settle the present obligation at the end of the financial year, taking into account the risks and uncertainties surrounding the obligation. Where a provision is measured using the cash flows estimated to settle the present obligation, its carrying amount is the present value of those cash flows, which is discounted using a pre-tax discount rate.

When some or all of the economic benefits required to settle a provision are expected to be recovered from a third party, the receivable is recognised as an asset if it is virtually certain that reimbursement will be received, and the amount of the receivable can be measured reliably.

Changes in the estimated timing or amount of the expenditure or discount rate are recognised in profit or loss as they arise.

2.8 Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents comprise cash at bank, cash on hand and demand deposits which are readily convertible to known amounts of cash and are subject to insignificant risk of changes in value.

2.9 Borrowing costs

Borrowing costs directly attributable to the acquisition, construction or production of qualifying assets, which are assets that necessarily take a substantial period of time to get ready for their intended use or sale, are added to the cost of those assets, until such time as the assets are substantially ready for their intended use or sale. Borrowing costs on general borrowings are capitalised by applying a capitalisation rate to construction or development expenditures that are financed by general borrowings. Investment income earned on the temporary investment of specific borrowings pending their expenditure on qualifying assets is deducted from the borrowing costs eligible for capitalisation.

All other borrowing costs are recognised in profit or loss in the period in which they are incurred.

2.10 Leases

At inception of a contract, the Group assessed whether the contract is, or contains, a lease. A contract is, or contains, a lease if the contract conveys the right to control the use of an identified asset for a period of time in exchange for consideration.

Where a contract contains more than one lease component, the Group allocates the consideration in the contract to each lease component on the basis of the relative standalone price of the lease component. Where the contract contains non-lease components, the Group applied the practical expedient to not to separate non-lease components from lease components, and instead account for each lease component and any associated non-lease components as a single lease component.

The Group recognises a right-of-use asset and lease liability at the lease commencement date for all lease arrangement for which the Group is the lessee, except for leases which have lease term of 12 months or less and leases of low value assets for which the Group applied the recognition exemption allowed under SFRS(I) 16 *Leases* ("SFRS(I) 16"). For these leases, the Group recognises the lease payment as an operating expense on a straight-line basis over the term of the lease.

The right-of-use asset is initially measured at cost, which comprises the initial amount of the lease liability adjusted for any lease payments made at or before the commencement date, less any lease incentives received, plus any initial direct costs incurred and an estimate of costs to dismantle and remove the underlying asset or to restore the underlying asset or the site on which it is located.

The right-of-use asset is subsequently depreciated using the straight-line method from the commencement date to the end of the lease term. When the lease transfers ownership of the underlying asset to the Group by the end of the lease term or the cost of the right-of-use asset reflects that the Group will exercise a purchase option, the right-of-use asset will be depreciated over the useful life of the underlying asset, which is determined on the same basis as those of property, plant and equipment. The right-of-use asset is also reduced by impairment losses, if any, and adjusted for certain remeasurements of the lease liability, where applicable. Right-of-use assets are depreciated on a straight-line basis over the shorter of the lease term and the estimated useful lives of the assets, as follows:

Office space	2 years
Office equipment	5 years

The lease liability is initially measured at the present value of the lease payments that are not paid at the commencement date, discounted using the interest rate implicit in the lease or, if that rate cannot be readily determined, the lessee's incremental borrowing rate.

The Group generally uses the incremental borrowing rate as the discount rate. To determine the incremental borrowing rate, the Group obtains a reference rate and makes certain adjustments to reflect the terms of the lease and the asset leased.

The lease payments included in the measurement of the lease liability comprise the following:

- fixed payments, including in-substance fixed payments less any lease incentive receivable,
- variable lease payments that depend on an index or a rate, initially measured using the index or rate as at the commencement date,
- amounts expected to be payable under a residual value guarantee,
- the exercise price under a purchase option that the Group is reasonably certain to exercise, and
- payments of penalties for terminating the lease if the Group is reasonably certain to terminate early and lease payments for an optional renewal period if the Group is reasonably certain to exercise an extension option.

The lease liability is measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method. The Group remeasures the lease liability when there is a change in the lease term due to a change in assessment of whether it will exercise a termination or extension or purchase option or due to a change in future lease payment resulting from a change in an index or a rate used to determine those payment.

Where there is a remeasurement of the lease liability, a corresponding adjustment is made to the right-of-use asset or in profit or loss where there is a further reduction in the measurement of the lease liability and the carrying amount of the right-of-use asset has been reduced to zero.

2.11 Income tax

Income tax expense represents the sum of the tax currently payable and deferred tax.

The tax currently payable is based on taxable profit for the year. Taxable profit differs from profit as reported profit or loss because it excludes items of income or expense that are taxable or deductible in other years and it further excludes items that are not taxable or tax deductible. The Group's liability for current tax is calculated using tax rates (and tax laws) that have been enacted or substantively enacted in countries where the Company and subsidiaries operate by the end of the financial year.

Deferred tax is recognised on the differences between the carrying amounts of assets and liabilities in the financial statements and the corresponding tax bases used in the computation of taxable profit, and are accounted for using the balance sheet liability method. Deferred tax liabilities are generally recognised for all taxable temporary differences and deferred tax assets are recognised to the extent that it is probable that taxable profits will be available against which deductible temporary differences can be utilised. Such assets and liabilities are not recognised if the temporary difference arises from goodwill or from the initial recognition (other than in a business combination) of other assets and liabilities in a transaction that affects neither the taxable profit nor the accounting profit and does not give rise to equal taxable and deductible temporary differences.

Deferred tax liabilities are recognised on taxable temporary differences arising on investments in subsidiaries, except where the Group is able to control the reversal of the temporary difference and it is probable that the temporary difference will not reverse in the foreseeable future.

A deferred income tax asset is recognised to the extent that it is probable that future taxable profit will be available against which the deductible temporary differences and tax losses can be utilised.

The carrying amount of deferred tax assets is reviewed at the end of each financial year and reduced to the extent that it is no longer probable that sufficient taxable profits will be available to allow all or part of the asset to be recovered.

Deferred tax is calculated at the tax rates that are expected to apply in the period when the liability is settled or the asset realised based on the tax rates (and tax laws) that have been enacted or substantively enacted by the end of the financial year and based on the tax consequence that will follow from the manner in which the Group expects, at the end of the financial year, to recover or settle the carrying amounts of its assets and liabilities except for the investment properties where investment properties measured at fair value are presented to be recovered entirely through sale.

Deferred tax assets and liabilities are offset when there is a legally enforceable right to set off current tax assets against current tax liabilities and when they relate to income taxes levied by the same taxation authority and the Group intends to settle its current tax assets and liabilities on a net basis, or to realise the assets and settle the liabilities simultaneously, in each future period in which significant amounts of deferred tax liabilities or assets are expected to be settled or recovered.

Current and deferred tax are recognised as an expense or income in profit or loss, except when they relate to items credited or debited directly to equity, in which case the tax is also recognised directly in equity, or where they arise from the initial accounting for a business combination. In the case of a business combination, the tax effect is taken into account in calculating goodwill or determining the excess of the acquirer's interest in the net fair value of the acquiree's identifiable assets, liabilities and contingent liabilities over cost.

2.12 Revenue recognition

Revenue is recognised when or as the Group satisfies a performance obligation by transferring a promised goods or service generated in the ordinary course of the Group's activities to its customer, at a transaction price that reflects the consideration the Group expects to be entitled in exchange for the goods or service and that is allocated to that performance obligation. The goods or service is transferred when or as the customer obtains control of the goods or service.

(a) Hotel operations revenue

Revenue derived from hotel operations include rental of rooms and food and beverage sales.

(i) Rental of rooms

Revenue is recognised over time for the occupancy of rooms.

(ii) Sales of food and beverages

Revenue is recognised at the point of sales of food and beverages.

(b) Dividend income

Dividend income is recognised in profit or loss at a point in time when the Group's right to receive payment is established.

(c) Interest income

Interest income is recognised over time using the effective interest method.

(d) Asset management revenue

Revenue arising from the provision of asset management services are recognised when services are rendered over time.

(e) Gains on disposal of investment securities at FVPL

Profits from sale of investment securities at FVPL are recognised at a point in time upon conclusion of the contract for sale.

2.13 Government grants

Government grants are recognised when there is reasonable assurance that the grant will be received and all attaching conditions will be complied with. Where the grant relates to an expense, the grant is recognised as income in profit or loss on a systematic basis over the periods in which the related costs, for which the grants are intended to compensate, is expensed. Where the grant relates to an asset, the grant is recognised as deferred capital grant on the statement of financial position and is amortised to profit or loss over the expected useful life of the relevant asset by equal annual instalment.

2.14 Retirement benefit costs

Payments to defined contribution retirement benefit plans are charged as an expense as they fall due. Payments made to state-managed retirement benefit schemes are dealt with as payments to defined contribution plans where the Group's obligations under the plans are equivalent to those arising in a defined contribution retirement benefit plan.

2.14 Retirement benefit costs (Continued)

For defined benefit retirement benefit plans, the cost of providing benefits is determined using the projected unit credit method, with actuarial valuations being carried out at the end of each financial year. Remeasurements comprising actuarial gains and losses, the effect of the asset ceiling (if applicable) and the return on plan assets (excluding interest) are recognised immediately in the statement of financial position with a charge or credit to other comprehensive income in the period in which they occur. Remeasurements recognised in other comprehensive income are not reclassified. Past service cost is recognised in profit or loss when the plan amendment or curtailment occurs, or when the Group recognises related restructuring costs or termination benefits, if earlier. Gains or losses on settlement of a defined benefit plan are recognised when the settlement occurs. Net interest is calculated by applying a discount rate to the net defined benefit liability or asset. Defined benefit costs are split into three categories:

- Service costs, which includes current service cost, past service cost and gains and losses on curtailments and settlements;
- Net interest expense or income; and
- Remeasurements.

The Group recognises service costs and net interest expense or income within profit or loss as staff costs.

The retirement benefit obligation recognised in the consolidated statement of financial position represents the deficit or surplus in the Group's defined benefit plans. Any surplus resulting from this calculation is limited to the present value of any economic benefits available in the form of refunds from the plans or reductions in future contributions to the plans.

A liability for a termination benefit is recognised at the earlier of when the entity can no longer withdraw the offer of the termination benefit and when the entity recognises any related restructuring costs.

Discretionary contributions made by employees or third parties reduce service cost upon payment of these contributions to the plan.

When the formal terms of the plans specify that there will be contributions from employees or third parties, the accounting depends on whether the contributions are linked to service, as follows:

- If the contributions are not linked to services (e.g. contributions are required to reduce a deficit arising from losses on plan assets or from actuarial losses), they are reflected in the remeasurement of the net defined benefit liability (asset).
- If contributions are linked to services, they reduce service costs. For the amount of contribution that is dependent on the number of years of service, the entity reduces service cost by attributing the contributions to periods of service using the attribution method required by SFRS(I) 1-19:70 for the gross benefits. For the amount of contribution that is independent of the number of years of service, the Group reduces service cost in the period in which the related service is rendered/reduces service cost by attributing contributions to the employees' periods of service in accordance with SFRS(I) 1-19:70.

2.15 Employee leave entitlements

Employee entitlements to annual leave are recognised when they accrue to employees. A provision is made for the estimated liability for annual leave as a result of services rendered by employees up to the end of the financial year.

2.16 Contingencies

A contingent liability is:

- (a) A possible obligation that arises from past events and whose existence will be confirmed only by the occurrence or non-occurrence of one or more uncertain future events not wholly within the control of the Group; or
- (b) A present obligation that arises from past events but is not recognised because:
 - (i) It is not probable that an outflow of resources embodying economic benefits will be required to settle the obligation; or
 - (ii) The amount of the obligation cannot be measured with sufficient reliability.

A contingent asset is a possible asset that arises from past events and whose existence will be confirmed only by the occurrence or non-occurrence of one or more uncertain future events not wholly within the control of the Group.

Contingencies are not recognised on the balance sheet of the Group, except for contingent liabilities assumed in a business combination that are present obligations and which the fair values can be reliably determined.

2.17 Segment reporting

Operating segments are reported in a manner consistent with the internal reporting provided to the chief operating decision-maker. The chief operating decision-maker, who is responsible for allocating resources and assessing performance of the operating segments, has been identified as the executive director and the board of directors who make strategic decisions.

3. Critical accounting judgements and key sources of estimation uncertainty

The Group made judgements, estimates and assumptions about the carrying amounts of assets and liabilities that were not readily apparent from other sources in the application of the Group's accounting policies. Estimates and judgements are continually evaluated and are based on historical experience and other factors that are considered to be reasonable under the circumstances. Actual results may differ from the estimates.

3.1 Critical judgements made in applying the Group's accounting policies

In the process of applying the Group's accounting policies, management has made the following judgments which has the most significant effect on the amounts recognised in the financial statements:

Classification of equity instruments as FVTOCI

The Group intends to hold its unquoted equity instruments for an indefinite period and may sell the investment in response to liquidity needs or in response to changes in the market conditions. Therefore, management has concluded that these equity instruments are not held for trading and has elected to classify and measure these equity instruments at FVTOCI.

3.1 Critical judgements made in applying the Group's accounting policies (Continued)

Determination of functional currency

The Group translates foreign currency items into the respective functional currencies of the Company and its subsidiaries. In determining the functional currencies of the entities in the Group, judgment is required to determine the currency that mainly influences its revenue streams and the economic environment. The functional currencies of the entities in the Group are determined based on management's assessment of the economic environment in which the entities operate.

3.2 Key sources of estimation uncertainty

The estimates and assumptions that have a significant risk of causing a material adjustment to the carrying amounts of assets and liabilities within the next financial year are discussed below.

Taxation

The Group has exposure to income and other taxes in various jurisdictions. Significant judgement is involved in determining the group-wide provision for income taxes. There are certain transactions and computations for which the ultimate tax determination is uncertain during the ordinary course of business. The Group recognises liabilities for expected tax issues based on estimates of whether additional taxes will be due. Where the final tax outcome of these matters is different from the amounts that were initially recognised, such differences will impact the income tax and deferred tax provisions in the period in which such determination is made. The carrying amount of the Group's income tax payable as at 31 July 2025 was \$16,000 (2024: \$32,000).

Impairment assessment for freehold property

The Group carries its freehold property at cost less accumulated depreciation and any accumulated impairment losses. Management reviews the carrying value of the freehold property and assesses if there is any indication of impairment in its freehold property by considering the related hotel asset's operating performance and evaluating if the hotel's performance is in line with the assumptions applied in the most recent hotel valuation.

In addition, management assesses, on an annual basis, whether there are triggering events, such as adverse changes in expected occupancy rates, discount rates, revenue growth rates and the competitive landscape in local markets, indicating potential impairment. Management engages an independent valuer in Singapore to determine the recoverable value of the freehold property. Management reviews the valuation carried out by the external valuer and adopts the valuation as recoverable value.

The determination of the recoverable value of the freehold property involves the use of a range of estimates (amongst others, capitalisation rates and discount rates) made by management and the independent valuer. The recoverable amount of the freehold property was based on its value-in-use and the pre-tax discount rate used was 7.50% (2024: 7.50%) per annum.

The carrying amount of the Group's freehold property at the end of the financial year is disclosed in Note 9 to the financial statements.

Impairment assessment of investment in subsidiaries

At the end of each financial year, an assessment is made on whether there are indicators that the Company's investments are impaired. Where applicable, the Company's assessments are based on the estimation of the value-in-use of the assets defined in SFRS(I) 1-36 *Impairment of Assets* by forecasting the expected future cash flows for a period of up to 5 years, using a suitable discount rate in order to calculate the present value of those cash flows. The Company's carrying amount of investments in subsidiaries as at 31 July 2025 was \$52,653,000 (2024: \$51,368,000) (Note 12).

Valuation of investments in unquoted equity instruments

The Group carries its investment in unquoted equity instruments at fair value, with changes in fair value being recognised in other comprehensive income.

The determination of the fair value of the unquoted equity instrument involves the use of a range of estimates (amongst others, capitalisation rates and discount rates) made by management and the external valuer. There was a level of estimation uncertainty in determining the valuation of the unquoted equity instrument as at 31 July 2025 arising from the changes in market and economic conditions brought on by macro-economic factors.

The carrying amount and key assumptions used to determine the fair value of the Group's unquoted equity instruments at the end of the financial year are disclosed in Note 21(d) to the financial statements.

Measurement of ECL of other receivables and long-term receivables

The Group uses an approach that is based on an assessment of qualitative and quantitative factors that are indicative of the risk of default. The Group assessed the impairment loss allowance of these amounts on a 12-month ECL basis consequent to their assessment and conclusion that the other receivables and long-term receivables are made to parties with good credit reputation and there has been no significant increase in the credit risk since the initial recognition of the financial asset. Using a 12-month ECL basis, the expected loss allowance on the Group's other receivables and long-term receivables as at 31 July 2025 was insignificant (Note 23).

Measurement of ECL of amount due from subsidiaries

The Company assessed the impairment loss allowance of these amounts on a 12-month ECL basis consequent to their assessment and conclusion that these receivables are of low credit risk. In its assessment of the credit risk of the subsidiaries, the Company considered amongst other factors, the financial position of the subsidiaries as of 31 July 2025, the past financial performance and cash flow trends, adjusted for the outlook of the industry and economy in which the subsidiaries operate in. Using a 12-month ECL basis, the expected loss allowance on the Company's amount due from subsidiaries as at 31 July 2025 was S\$12,326,000 (2024: S\$15,456,000) (Note 23).

Deferred tax assets

Deferred tax assets are recognised for all unused tax losses, unutilised capital allowances and other temporary differences to the extent that it is probable that taxable profit will be available against which the losses can be utilised. Significant management judgement is required to determine the amount of deferred tax assets that can be recognised, based upon the timing and level of future taxable profits together with future tax planning strategies. In determining the timing and level of future taxable profits together with future tax planning strategies, the Group assessed the probability of expected future cash inflows based on the next 5 years.

Where taxable profits are expected in the foreseeable future, deferred tax assets are recognised on the unused tax losses, unutilised capital allowances and other temporary differences. The carrying amount of the Group's deferred tax assets as at 31 July 2025 was \$526,000 (2024: \$509,000) (Note 16).

On 11 June 2015, through a private placement exercise, the Company allotted and issued 65,000,000 new ordinary shares to a third-party group at an issue price of \$0.11235 per share. The placement took place prior to the Company's share consolidation of every three existing issued ordinary shares in the capital of the Company into one ordinary share on 1 December 2015. Total proceeds of \$7,302,750 were raised, of which \$57,596 was utilised for expenses incurred for the issue of the new ordinary shares. The net proceeds of \$7,245,154 are intended to be used for property related businesses, of which an aggregate amount of \$4,986,211 (2024: \$4,982,863) had been utilised for capital expenditure incurred for TLMC as at 31 July 2025 and 2024.

Use of proceeds from rights issue of warrants

For the financial year ended 31 July 2023, the Company issued 109,537,422 warrants at an issue price of \$0.01 for each warrant and raised net proceeds amounting to \$926,000 for the Group's general working capital. As at 31 July 2025, \$926,000 (2024: \$926,000) had been utilised for operating expenses including payroll, professional fees, compliance fees and other related costs.

For the proceeds from the exercise of warrants, up to \$5.5 million will be allocated for growth initiatives and the amount that exceeding \$5.5 million will be used for the Group's general working capital. Risk management framework

The Group's activities expose it to credit risk, liquidity risk and market risks (including equity price risk and foreign currency risk). The Group's overall risk management strategy seeks to minimise adverse effects from the volatility of financial markets on the Group's financial performance.

Risk management is integral to the whole business of the Group. The Group has a system of controls in place to create an acceptable balance between the cost of risks occurring and the cost of managing the risks. Management continually monitors the Group's risk management process to ensure that an appropriate balance between risk and control is achieved. Risk management policies and systems are reviewed regularly to reflect changes in market conditions and the Group's activities.

There have been no changes to the Group's exposure to these financial risks or the manner in which it manages and measures the risks. Market risk exposures are measured using sensitivity analysis indicated below.

Credit risk

Risk management policy

Credit risk is the potential financial loss to the Group if a customer or a counterparty to a financial instrument fails to meet its contractual obligations, and arises principally from the Group's receivables from customers.

The carrying amounts of financial assets in the statements of financial position represent the Group's and the Company's respective maximum exposure to credit risk. The Group and the Company do not hold any collateral in respect of their financial assets.

The Group has established credit limits for customers and monitors their balances. Cash and fixed deposits are placed with financial institutions which are regulated. Transactions involving derivative financial instruments are allowed only with counterparties that are of high quality.

The Group considers the probability of default upon initial recognition of an asset and whether there has been a significant increase in credit risk on an ongoing basis throughout each reporting period. The Group has determined the default event on a financial asset to be when the counterparty fails to make contractual payments that are past due 90 days, based on the Group's historical estimate.

To assess whether there is a significant increase in credit risk, the Group considers available reasonable and supportive forwarding-looking information which includes the following indicators:

- Actual or expected significant adverse changes in business, financial or economic conditions that are expected to cause a significant change to the counterparty's ability to meet its obligations
- Actual or expected significant changes in the operating results of the counterparty

Regardless of the analysis above, a significant increase in credit risk is presumed if a debtor is more than 30 days past due in making contractual payment.

The Group determines that its financial assets are credit-impaired when:

- There is significant difficulty of the issuer or the borrower;
- A breach of contract, such as a default or past due event;
- It is becoming probable that the borrower will enter bankruptcy or other financial reorganisation;
- There is a disappearance of an active market for that financial asset because of financial difficulty.

(a) Trade receivables

The Group applied the simplified approach and recognised lifetime expected credit losses for all trade receivables based on the Group's historical observed default rates analysed in accordance to days past due by grouping of customers based on similar loss pattern. The expected credit losses also incorporated forward looking information such as forecast of economic conditions.

The Group has assessed the expected credit losses recognised for the financial years ended 31 July 2025 and 2024 to be insignificant.

(b) Other receivables and long-term receivables

As of 31 July 2025, the Group recorded other receivables and long-term receivables amounted to \$202,000 (2024: \$130,000) and \$6,305,000 (2024: \$6,305,000), respectively. The Group assessed those debtors' credit reputation and concluded that there has been no significant increase in the credit risk since the initial recognition of the financial assets. Accordingly, the Group used the general approach and estimated the 12-months expected credit losses and determined that ECL was insignificant.

(c) Amounts due from subsidiaries

As of 31 July 2025, the Company recorded an amount due from subsidiaries of \$64,977,000 (2024: \$66,822,000) consequent to an extension of loans to the subsidiaries. In its assessment of the credit risk of the subsidiaries, the Company considered amongst other factors, the financial position of the subsidiaries as of 31 July 2025. The Company concluded that these receivables were of low credit risk other than the credit impaired amount of \$12,326,000 (2024: \$15,456,000). The Company assessed the impairment loss allowance of these amounts on a 12-month ECL basis.

Liquidity risk

Risk management policy

Liquidity risk is the risk that the Group will encounter difficulty in meeting financial obligations due to shortage of funds. The Group's approach to managing liquidity is to ensure, as far as possible, that it will always have sufficient liquidity to meet its liabilities when due, under both normal and stressed conditions, without incurring unacceptable losses or risking damage to the Group's reputation.

The Group monitors its liquidity risk on an ongoing basis and maintains a level of cash and bank balances deemed adequate by management to finance the Group's operations and to mitigate the effects of fluctuations in cash flows.

Market risk

Market risk is the risk that the fair value or future cash flows of the Group's financial instruments will fluctuate because of changes in market prices (other than interest or exchange rates).

Equity and debt price risk

The Group is exposed to equity and debt price risk arising from its investment in quoted investment securities. These investment securities are quoted on the SGX-ST in Singapore and are classified as held for trading financial assets. The objective of market risk management is to manage and control market risk exposures within acceptable parameters, while optimising the return.

Sensitivity analysis for equity and debt price risk

As at 31 July 2025, if the price of the shares held had been 2% (2024: 2%) higher/lower with all other variables held constant, the Group's loss before tax would have been \$77,600 (2024: \$10,000) lower/higher, arising as a result of lower/higher fair value losses on quoted investment securities. The Group did not hold any quoted investment securities in the prior financial year.

Currency risk

Risk management policy

The Group is exposed to currency risk on sales, purchases and cash holdings that are denominated in currencies other than the respective functional currencies of the Group entities. The currencies in which these transactions primarily are denominated are the Korean won ("KRW").

There is no formal hedging policy with respect to foreign exchange exposures. Exposures to currency risk are monitored on an ongoing basis and the Group endeavours to keep the net exposures at an acceptable level, by buying or selling foreign currencies at forward rates when necessary to address short-term imbalances.

The Group's and Company's monetary assets and monetary liabilities exposures to currency risk arise primarily from its bank balances and exposures are insignificant.

24. Capital management

In managing the capital of the Group, the Board aims to maintain a capital structure which balances the need to maximise the rate of return on capital and at the same time safeguard the Group's ability to continue as a going concern in the long term, maintain investors, creditors and market confidence, and sustain future development of the business.

The Group defines capital as share capital and reserves.

The Group manages the level of capital in proportion to risk and future business development requirements while balancing the need to maximise the return on capital. The Group does not stipulate the desired level of capital. It monitors and manages its capital structure on an ongoing basis and makes adjustments to it in light of changes in economic conditions, risk characteristics of the underlying assets and performance of the Group.

24. Capital management (Continued)

As part of the capital management process, the Group may adjust its level of dividends, issue new shares and/or return capital to shareholders, where appropriate. The Board takes into consideration the cash position and business and capital requirements of the Group when determining the level of dividends to pay shareholders. From time to time, the Company may also purchase its own shares from the market or off-market; the timing of these purchases depends on market conditions and prices.

There was no change to the Group's approach to capital management during the year.

The Company and its subsidiaries are not subject to any externally imposed capital requirement.

25. Subsequent Events

On 30 June 2025, the Company's wholly-owned subsidiary, RK One Hotel management LLC ("RK One") had served a termination notice of the Hotel Management Agreement ("HMA") to Travelodge Hotel (Asia) Pte Ltd for the hotel management of Travelodge Myeongdong City Hall. The HMA's expiry date is on 31 December 2025. .

Following a strategic review of its operations, on 24 October 2025, RK One has entered into a brand licensing agreement with a new hospitality brand. Under the new arrangement, RK One will self-manage the hotel operations and will rebrand the hotel as Klaven Myeongdong City Hall, with effect from 1 January 2026.

This development did not have a material impact on the financial results for the financial year ended 31 July 2025.
